

transfer of his property to the Government, and as for Mr. Warburton's interests, he will derive no more pecuniary benefit from the purchase than will the editor of the Islander, unless it please Sir H. Walsh to make him some return for the unflinching honesty and zeal with which Mr. Warburton discharged his trust as agent, and the great value he has given to the property by a large expenditure of labour and the appropriation of the annual rents in the opening up of new roads, which rents he might have put into his own pocket, after the fashion of the Islander's Tory friends, if his notions of honesty were as loose as theirs and his conscience as easy.

With respect to the Worrell Estate, we are rejoiced to learn that it is passing rapidly from the hands of the Government to those of actual settlers and others:—for the last month or more, the applications for blocks of fifty, a hundred and two hundred acres, have been very numerous and incessant; and there is every reason to believe that before the elapse of many more months, every acre of what is usually called the Worrell Property will be actually sold or engaged—and the tract of land which it comprises be the most flourishing and populous in the whole Island. This shows that the public opinion with regard to the Land Bill has not been corrupted in the least by that worthless driveller who promulgates his weekly libels in the Islander against its principles and provisions; nor yet has it been weakened or influenced by the escheat delusion, which the Islander and its Tory friends did their little possible to propagate. It may be as well to remark here, that the very moderate price at which the Government have been enabled to sell land under the provisions of the Act in question, has had a material influence in lessening the price of land in other parts of the Colony. For instance, the Agent of a large property in Prince County would never sell any portion of it under thirty shillings an acre, previous to the Land Purchase Act going into operation; he has now reduced his price to twenty shillings, when he finds that farmers can purchase from the Government the best land in the Island at prices varying from seven to twelve shillings and six-pence; and we are sure that the same Agent, as well as others, will yet find himself obliged to take much less than twenty shillings an acre. The Tory party have encouraged, for a purely factious purpose, a discontent against the leasehold tenure, and a disposition not to pay rent. The only alternative, therefore, for those amongst them who have property is, to sell out, and the example of the Government will compel them to sell at a cheap rate.

SHERIFF'S BILL.

It was confidently asserted by the Islander, on two or three occasions during the last summer, that the Sheriff's Bill was, or would be disallowed by Her Majesty the Queen. The assumption was probably founded on the hope that the efforts then being made by Messrs. Holl and Company, when they took upon themselves the duty of delegates to the Colonial Office, would prove successful. Mr. Holl sent or carried to England his protest against the Bill—the land proprietors and their agents, both here and in England, petitioned the Queen to disallow it; and the very concisest gentlemen who waited upon Lord John Russell, at the Colonial Office, and subsequently on his successor, Sir William Molesworth—besought, no doubt, the Royal interference to the same effect. But the Islander has shown itself to be—not the first time indeed—quite a false prophet.—Mr. Holl's protest has turned out to be a very harmless thing,—and the influence of the great proprietors—the Seymours, Havillands, &c., appears to have fallen to a ruinous discount at the Colonial Office. For the last English Mail brought out the Sheriff's Bill, assented to by the Queen. Several other acts of the last Session have also received the royal allowance. The Bank Act, we regret to say, is not amongst the number. For what purpose this is detained, it is impossible for us to say. The want of a Bank is a serious impediment to the trade, not of Charlottetown only, but of the whole Island; and the Legislature having framed the charter of one in accordance with instructions received from England, the least that could be done for the Colony, in order to promote its prosperity, would be to let that charter go into operation. We do not hesitate to say that the best interests of this Island are trifled with by the Colonial Office, in its tardiness in bringing before Her Majesty a subject so essentially local as the establishment of a Bank.

The October Term of the Supreme Court will commence to-morrow. We are not aware of any important or remarkable cases to come on for trial. That threatened prosecution for libel—D. Maclean vs. the Editor of the Examiner—appears to be altogether abandoned, notwithstanding a recent declaration to the contrary. Maclean has common sense enough to understand the public opinion regarding him, and to know that not a Jury could be found in the country who would give him six-pence for his character. We presume we may now take it for granted that the report about the felony is perfectly correct, since he has not ventured to disprove it, either in or out of Court. No wonder that many of the more respectable of the Tory party are ashamed of having such an advocate—endeavoring to impress others with the belief that the Islander, under its present management, does not represent their opinions, and virtuously exclaim that they have ceased to pay Maclean, through Ings' "itching palm," their proportion of his filthy wages. The Islander has, therefore, the superlative honor of being the representative, for the most part, of the knaves and blockheads of the Tory Faction.

Ship News.

The new Ship "Herold," 1,200 tons, Captain Smith, on her first voyage from Bathurst, N. B., bound for Liverpool, G. B., proving leaky after being on a short time, the crew unable to keep the ship free, bore up for Bathurst, but the wind coming off Cape Misson, they put the ship before the wind for the east end of this Island, intending to make for Pictou, N. S., but in beating up Northumberland Strait, on Thursday morning, a little before daylight, the ship struck with much violence on Cape Bear Reef, near the Malabar Rocks; the seamen immediately deserted the ship, leaving only the officers on board, who, with the help of people from the shore, and being favored with fine weather, succeeded in getting her off yesterday morning, when she ran into Georgetown to repair. We understand from B. Davies, Esq., the Protective Agent for the Provincial Insurance Company, C. W., who has just returned from the ship, that she is but slightly injured, and probably may not require any further repairs than caulking; we think that if the other Insurance Companies had agents to look after their interests, much valuable property, as in this instance, might be saved.—H. G.

The ship above referred to is a splendid vessel, worth, we understand, about £20,000. There is no doubt that had it not been for the prompt action taken by Mr. Davies, she would have been on the reef, and sold ere this, at a very heavy loss to the underwriters.—Ed. Ex.
