Montague Meteors took the second game of the home and home intermediate hockey semi-final series by defeating the Georgetown Eagles 7-5 at the Montague rink last night, taking the round 15-6. Georgetown opened the game with a four-minute sustained attack before Montague crossed the opposing blue line. The Eagles were out to win the game, and though seven goals behind, fought splendidly and well to try to cut the lead.
