FRUIT EXPORTS.

It is very pleasing to note that our Fruit Grower's Association is devoting itself to business. There is business to be done. It is now beyond a doubt or peradventure that we can produce apples, plums and small fruits of finest quality. The problem for solution is to produce fruit suitable and sufficient for export to Great Britain and to place it upon the market advantageously. We have in the Lake Winnipeg a means of transport to the Mother Country. But if we are to succeed in the production of fruit for export our fruit growers must be organized and they must co-operate. The Fruit Grower's Association of Prince Edward Island, recently incorporated and consolidated, representing every section of the Province, is the means to this end. Its importance and the necessity of sustaining it is, therefore, evident. Lieutenant Governor Howland, Mr. Bayfield, Father Burke and those who have co-operated with them in the formation of the association, have performed a great service to the Province. It now remains for those who have orchards to co-operate according to the plans of the Association as outlined in the report of the meeting held yesterday,—then we shall without doubt, achieve a fair measure of success in the production and export of fruit, and another source of income and wealth will have been added to the Province.

As a result of the experience and information that has been gained by its members, the Association has decided upon the varieties of apples to which the efforts of our orchardists had better be concentrated in order to succeed in the English markets. The varieties are: Wealthy, Alexander, Golden Russet, Kings, Ribston Pippin, Northern Spy and Gravenstein. All of these are good fruit producers and are well adapted to our climate; and it has been found that they suit the British taste so well that they fetch the higher prices. By top-grafting these varieties upon the hardy stock of existing trees, our farmers will, in the course of a few years obtain fruit in sufficient quantities for shipment,—and all the while they may be enlarging the borders of their orchards. Their efforts need not be confined altogether to apples, for we are convinced that success in export can also, with the aid of cold storage, be obtained in respect to plums—a splendid specimen of which from Mr. Bayfield's orchard was shown at the meeting held on Tuesday—and smaller fruits.

The movement that has been begun by the Association would be greatly assisted if our Liberal Government would but institute methods of practical instruction in fruit growing and means of co-operation similar to those instituted by the Conservative Government in respect to the dairy. We agree with Senator Ferguson that if an energetic and enthusiastic orchardist were sent to the provinces, as Mr. Dillon was sent to work up our cheese and butter interests, a revolution in fruit growing would soon be inaugurated from which capital results would be obtained. The Provincial Government would, we feel sure, be glad to place a portion of the Government farm at the disposal of the Dominion officials as a base of operations. Trees might there be planted and experiments made; thither our farmers could resort for hints in fruit growing which they would take to their own orchards and apply for themselves; and from thence the Dominion orchardists could go to the various sections of the Province to deliver lectures of instruction in fruit growing and to give illustrations in grafting, etc. We hope that Sir Louis Davies will exert his influence with the Minister of Agriculture, and have this suggestion carried into effect.

THE NORTHWEST GOVERNORSHIP

CONTRARY to expectation, the Lieutenant Governorship of the Northwest Territories has gone to one who was not a member of Parliament. There is no rule to which an exception is not occasionally made! As to Mr. Forget's claims and qualifications we know nothing. Formerly he was the Hon. David Laird's private secretary; now Mr. Laird takes the position which he vacates. He has been long a member of the civil service of Canada in connection with the Northwest and it is reported that he is well informed on constitutional procedure and political questions. Mr. Laird's appointment as Indian Commissioner, in succession to him, is to be classed among the caprices of fate and the unexpected events that happen. That Mr. Laird will worthily fill the important office to which he has been called we make

no doubt. But we think that, considering Mr. Laird's years and his services to the Liberal party—not to speak of his former success as Lieutenant Governor of the Territories—the Liberal Government ought to have given him the less onerous and more honorable position to which they have preferred Mr. Forget.

THE RAILWAY STATION.

The occurrence of another case of fever at the P. E. Island railway station in this city suggests something rotten about the place. We learn that Dr. Warburton, Chairman of the Board of Health has condemned it as unwholesome. This being the case, the authorities are in duty bound to look into the matter. We suggest, as the best and upon the whole the most economical procedure, the tearing down of the old station house and the building of a new one in a better locality. For the convenience of traffic and business, as well as to obtain improved sanitary conditions, the site of our railway station ought to be further west than it is.

A DISTINCT TRIUMPH.

ONE of the most important prizes awarded at the late cattle show in Halifax was the "sweepstakes," for the best herd composed of one bull and four females, open to all the beef breeds. Four herds of Short-horns entered the ring, and one herd of Herefords owned by Mr. Black, of Amherst, whose Herefords have been famous for many years. Mr. Black's herd had at its head the costly and grand bull Sir Horace, said, by those who know, to be the best Hereford bull in Canada. But after a close inspection of the animals composing the various herds, the judges appeared to have no hesitation in placing the P. E. Island herd, owned by Mr. F. G. Boyer, first, with the Herefords second. As the females in the Island herd were all bred in this Province, the result is decidedly something for Island farmers to be proud of; for the females in most of the other Shorthorn herds were lately brought from Ontario for show purposes.


