

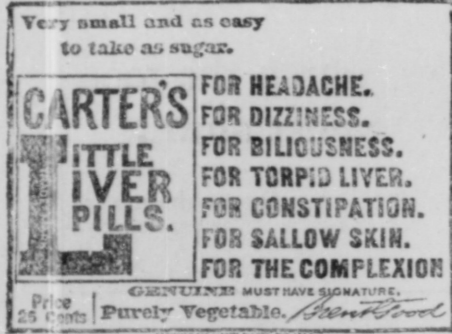

### ANOTHER LETTER FROM AFRICA.

Pte. Herbert Brown Writes From Paardeberg.

Captain Hooper has received the following letter from Herbert Brown. It is dated February 23rd:—

DEAR CAPTAIN,—Just a word. All is well so far. We have had two days of it and expect lots of it yet, perhaps this day with us, as you no doubt have already noticed by the number of our casualties. The Canadians' share of losses is about 100 in two days. Most of them were lost on the first day. Poor Roland Taylor was shot through the heart and he died almost immediately. Fred Ware will get better. The closest call I had was 2½ feet to my left,—and I have that bullet. The boys all acted very brave and did their duty better than a good many of the regulars.

Several other regiments lost heavily, but none so badly as ours. We occupied the most exposed position and charged the enemy's position about sundown on Sunday and forced them to retire. Their position was in a river bed, and a very strong one. It will take some days to make the thing complete, but the result is sure.

The battlefield was a hard sight the morning after the battle. I had charge of a cart burying the dead. We are having a hard time, little or no sleep and only one small meal a day. I am in excellent health and the best of spirits. I have not time to write any more and you will have to consider it a compliment to get this as I am in full readiness on the battlefield to meet the enemy any moment. We are expecting reinforcements for the enemy. Our nearest station is 40 miles away. We cannot get any mail. This letter goes by negro on horseback. During the five days before the fight we walked 77 miles, twenty-two and a half miles on the night before the fight with only one half hour's rest in the morning. Love to all. Good bye.

### NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Premier McDonald, of Manitoba, has lost no time. The Legislature is now in session. At its opening on the 29th, Lieutenant Governor Patterson said legislation will be asked restoring equilibrium of finances and a bill will be introduced reducing the number of ministers and the salaries. The government is under the necessity of refusing to submit for the ratification of the House certain orders in council granting aid to a certain railway, also of refusing to supplement the promise of aid to the companies; an act respecting the present election law will be introduced also a bill dealing with the prohibition of the liquor traffic.

### Japanese War Preparations.

SEATTLE, Wash., March 29. The Government transport Garone, from Manila February 17, has arrived from quarantine with crews of active preparations in military and naval departments of Japan with war with Russia. The Russian fleet at Nagasaki has disregarded the harbor authorities and anchored where it pleased. The war spirit is said by Captain Conard of the Garone to be strong in Japan on account of the czar's secret attempt to gain influence in Korea in violation of the treaty. A grand assembling of the Japanese navy, to be followed by manoeuvres from which foreign newspaper correspondents and the public were excluded, was fixed for this month.

### Pork Prohibited.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 30.—The Port has informed the United States legation that in future the importation of American pork will be prohibited, giving as a reason for the prohibition that the meat is injurious to public health. Lloyd C. Griscomb, United States charge d'affaires, protested energetically, demanding the annulment of the measure.

### The Duke's Pride.

CORK, March 30.—The Duke of Connaught, commander of the forces in Ireland who has completed his tour of military inspection, was entertained yesterday by the sheriffs of Cork, to whom he expressed the pleasure he felt at having received his new command in the country where he got his title. He avowed his pride in the exploits of the Irish troops in South Africa, and his satisfaction in the good will of the people of Cork, who had shown their desire to respect the Queen.

### Local and Other Items.

CHILDREN BURNED.—Three little children were burned to death in a fire which destroyed the cottage home of John Brassil, a farm laborer, in East Providence, R. I., on-day last week. The mother was badly burned in trying to rescue the little ones.

WHERE COAL IS SCARCE.—The North Sydney Herald says: Coal is a scarce and costly article in North Sydney just now. Slack or nut coal cannot be had at any price, and round coal is hard to get. This in a coal country must appear strange to the outside public, but it is nevertheless true.

STEAMER ON FIRE.—The steamer Manchester Commerce, which arrived at Halifax from Manchester a few days ago had a narrow escape from being burned at sea on the passage out. A fire burst through the ventilator from one of the holds, and after a hard fight was sufficiently checked to allow the sailors to remove the cargo. The damage to the freight is said to be heavy.

LONDON, March 30.—Arrangements for the Queen's visit to Dublin are rapidly nearing completion. Two detachments of Life Guards left London last evening to act as the Royal escort; and the trials of the royal trains have been completed along the entire route. Mr. Gerald Balfour, chief secretary for Ireland, who is just recovering from a serious illness, will leave tomorrow in order to welcome the Queen, who will probably be accompanied by Lord Lansdowne, secretary of state for war.
