Consider Safety Angle If Gouzenko Meets U.S. Senate

OTTAWA, (CP)—An R. C. M. P. source said Monday night that the personal safety of Igor Gouzenko, the former Russian embassy clerk who exposed Canada's wartime spy ring, would be the main consideration if he were to meet members of a U. S. Senate sub-committee to tell them what he knows.

The source said he "wouldn't want to conjecture" on whether such a meeting could be arranged. He was commenting on a statement in New York by the McCarthy Senate permanent investigations sub-committee and the Jenner internal security sub-committee. They said they would be

"delighted" to talk to Gouzenko, who had been quoted as saying a meeting "might be worthwhile." Gouzenko has been living in secrecy under RCMP protection since he left the Russian embassy here and turned over information which exposed wartime Communist espionage in Canada.

The RCMP source said Gouzenko is under no security restrictions except those he agrees to. It was a "matter of consultation and advice" by the RCMP.
