Public Morality in England.

THE recent trial of the Oxford University professor who endeavored to levy blackmail upon Lord Russell, has given rise to a comparison of the morality of public men in England at the present time with the morality of the public men of former generations. It has been pointed out that in the old days, when a Minister of the Crown was not expected to compete in virtue with a minister of religion, and when even ministers of religion were very frequently shining examples to their flocks of the kind of conduct to be most carefully avoided, a blackmailer had nothing like the field which he now possesses for his operations. If he had, for instance, demanded money from Sir Horace Walpole under threat of accusing him of political corruption, or from John Wilkes in lieu of trumpeting him abroad as a prodigal, we can imagine the complete contempt with which such claims would have been regarded. Political corruption and personal prodigality were, unhappily, not so rare among statesmen in those days that any great shock would have been given to the public mind if accusations of this sort had been made. Nor were there such means as nowadays exist for spreading the story broadcast among the people. Now all is changed. The tone of public morals has become far purer, and consequently men are much more alarmed than they used to be if they think there is a chance of their fair fame being aspersed.

In the Far East.

EXTRACT FROM A LETTER FROM REV. D. D. MOORE TO A FRIEND.
PENANG, 10th February, 1892.
I am making wonderful progress with the wealthy Baba people. I am on terms of intimacy and good fellowship with them, such as few Europeans enjoy, visiting at their palaces and receiving them frequently at our beautiful lodge. I believe they are going to take right hold of our enterprise, and help us to establish a great Chinese Baba College before long. To-day I have been driving about with a Chinese gentleman, whose house would cover nearly the whole of your Prince of Wales College grounds. It was a grand sight, during the nights of the New Year's holidays, illuminated with various colored lights from cupolas to basement. In the compound attached to our lodge or bungalow, we have a lawn tennis range, and find it fine and necessary recreation. It also attracts our Babas, and you would laugh to see a Baba, in his gorgeous silks and streaming tauchangorquie, skipping about among the tennis balls. They soon become adept at the game, even the very fat ones showing an astonishing nimbleness. I am glad to say that the Malay rebellion at Penang is over at last. The English forces, with the Sultan's combined, have driven the insurgent chief from his almost invincible stockade in the jungle, and again there is peace.

The waters around us here in the Straits Settlements are very shallow, the whole Straits being apparently the result of a submergence of land in the far away years of the past. Penang is like Ararat, on which the ark rested, the top of an un-eroded hill range. Some day it again may change. The whole history of life and of the stages of action, which infuse the physical world, might be briefly headed "Ups and Downs"—but I trust that the last cataclysm will give us an everlasting upwardness, even above all things for aye.

When you receive this another Canadian winter will be almost over. Be sure to send me a Mayflower to remember the old spring time. I have almost forgotten now that there are such periods in the year as seasons. The climatic changes here are almost imperceptible.

I should like my old friends in Cornwall and other parts of the country to know that I do not forget them. The remembrance of their kindness is as precious fragrance to me in these Eastern lands.

Do you know I take daily dips in the sea, which I find very invigorating, using every precaution to avoid all possibility of danger from crocodiles, sharks and other gruesome creatures which infest these shores, for I want to do several things before sailing off in an alligator's maw.

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Farmers Trading Association.

A meeting of the farmers of Lower Montague and vicinity was held in the Hall on the 17th inst, for the purpose of discussing the advisability of forming a Farmers' Trading Association for Montague and surrounding districts. The meeting was called to order by appointing Ch. McNeil, Esq., to the chair, and the undersigned secretary.

The chairman, in a brief and appropriate speech, explained the purport of the meeting, and introduced W. P. Lewis, Esq. of Cardigan, who had been asked and kindly consented to attend and explain what had been done in the Cardigan Farmers' Association movement. He commenced by showing the changes that had taken place in the trade of the Three Rivers within the last few years, where the best prices used to be obtained for produce, and showed that now the prices paid there are the very worst on the Island. He pointed out, not in empty assertions but in plain figures, the terrible loss sustained in their part of the country to farmers, storekeepers, tradesmen and others, not only to their purses but also to their property, by the mischievous practice now followed of selling the farmers' produce to the lowest bidder. He explained the benefits that would accrue from organization, socially, in the purchase of improved animals for breeding purposes, good seeds, artificial manures, etc., and said it had been the life and prosperity of every other calling, and why not be the same for farmers? Every person on the Island had to depend on the farmer, and he hoped that all would put their shoulders to the wheel and shove, as the prosperity of the farmers was the prosperity of all the others. Capt. Howlett, Sturgeon, Messrs. Aiken, (storekeeper), Collins, Anwar and Thompson, also spoke on the subject, saying in effect that something must be done to stop the practice which is being going on these late years, or else the farmers would have to move to some other place. They expressed the confidence they had in organization, and said that farmers should have organized long ago, and they would have been in a very different position to-day.

A committee was appointed to draw out a constitution and bye-laws to submit to next meeting, to be held on 31st, at 2 p. m. A unanimous vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. Lewis for his kindness in coming to a diving us so much information on the subject, which was appropriately acknowledged.

A vote of thanks was tendered to the chairman, after which the meeting dispersed, all highly pleased with the result.

Notes from Red Point.

The fine weather of the early part of this month inspired the people with the hope that it would be an early spring for farming and fishing, but Jack Frost returned in full blast and reversed the order of things.

The l-battery factory at Red Point owned by Messrs McInnis, McLellan & Co. is undergoing repairs this spring. This enterprising firm began operations in the fishing business in the summer of 1889, and since that time they have made rapid strides in advancement. Last year they shipped to foreign markets seven hundred cases of lobsters, and three hundred cases of capelin, but their principal trade this year will be the canning of smelts.

We are very glad to see our Patriotic correspondent in our midst again looking hale and hearty after his sojourn among the Indians of the West. He speaks in the highest terms of the treatment he received from those savage tribes, which will likely be seen in the Patriot at some future date.

A skating match took place on Black Pond ice on St. Patrick's Day between Mr. John C. McDonald and Mr. Hector McNeill. The race consisted of three one-mile heats. In the first heat Mr. McNeill came to the front in style, leaving his opponent about five yards in the rear. The second and third heats were won by Mr. McDonald in an apparently easy manner, thus leaving the spectators in doubt whether or not he would have been able to win the first.

The farmers of this place have formed themselves into an association and have set about the erection of a cheese factory which they propose to have in operation this summer. This is a step in the right direction.
