Crackdown Continues On Lobster Fishermen

TIGNISH—A lobster boat and its cargo of thirty-five traps and 350 pounds of lobster, was seized early Saturday morning at Tignish by officers of the Federal Department of Fisheries in their continued crackdown on illegal lobster fishing on Prince Edward Island.

Reported to have been operated by Joseph Pitre and his brother John, both of Tignish, the fishing boat was intercepted south of Tignish Run about 1.30 a.m. by Captain Cyrus Bernard, protection officer Elmore MacKay and wardens Thane Douglas and Reg Eldershaw on board

MONTAGUE—An accident on Sunday morning at Lower Montague between a 1958 Renault and a 1954 Chevrolet necessitated hospital treatment for Mrs. Cornelia Taylor of Lower Montague who was a passenger with her husband in the Renault.

The accident occurred when one of the cars was making a turn into a lane at Lower Montague. The Renault was extensively damaged, ending up in the ditch.
