Disaster Committee Organized At Tignish

J. Hector Buote was named chairman of the Red Cross disaster committee at Tignish at an organizational meeting held in the Tignish Parish Hall on Thursday evening.

Appointed deputy chairman was Aubrey Galant, and as chairmen of the sub-committees, Mrs. Sloyce Ellis, food and clothing; Leslie Maillette, shelter; Mrs. Wilfred Shea, registration and enquiry; and Mrs. Reg. Eldershaw, first aid.

The Tignish and Alberton committees between them will decide upon the area to be served by each.

Robert Younker of Charlottetown, provincial chairman of Red Cross disaster services, speaking at Thursday night's meeting said that in the first six months of this year, the nine disaster committees had rendered emergency services to 116 victims of 17 fires which destroyed homes, at a cost of \$1,096. This is almost equal to the total assistance rendered during 1958, and was largely caused by the disastrous fire which involved eight families in Souris.

This meeting, which was organized by Mrs. Wade Harper of Anglo Tignish, was attended by Father Rooney, representatives from the Tignish Branch, Canadian Legion, its Ladies' Auxiliary and the Tignish Parish Council, Catholic Women's League, as well as Constable Grady and a representative of the fire department.

Frank MacDonald of Charlottetown, deputy provincial chairman, Red Cross disaster services, and Miss Iphigene Arsenault, provincial Red Cross Commissioner, were also present at this meeting.

Ch'ship Meet Slated Today

SUMMERSIDE — What could prove to be one of the best Maritime championship track and field meets ever staged here gets underway this afternoon at Queen Elizabeth Park at 1:15.

Two of the top entries in the meet will be Joe Mullins of Glace Bay and Alfred Groom of Summerside. Mullins, considered the best half-miler in Canada, will be gunning for the Canadian record of 1:11.7 in his special event while Groom, holder of the Maritime pole vault mark, will be aiming at the Canadian record of 13 feet 9 inches.

Both Mullins and Groom were considering entering the Pan American Games trials being held today in western Canada, but both have decided to bring their talents to Summerside.

LARGE CROWD WATCHES S'SIDE EVENT

Lunenburg Firemen Win Maritime Tournament

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — A superbly conditioned team of firemen from Lunenburg, N.S., made a runaway of events in the Maritime Firemen's Tournament here yesterday. Lunenburg won the aggregate cup with a total of 24 points.

Moncton firemen were second with nine points and Charlottetown third with seven.

The Lunenburg competitors won first placings in the hose reel race, ladder race, duty race and hose replacement race. They added four more points on a second and third gained in the hose-coupling race.

Points were awarded on a five, three and one basis for a first, second and third place.

Moncton won a thrilling first in the hose-coupling race when they nosed out the Lunenburg first team by one tenth of a second. Charlottetown was tied with Bible Hill, N.S., and the Lunenburg second team for third place as each squad was timed in 11 seconds flat.

The most exciting event for the large crowd of spectators on hand was the ladder race won by Lunenburg when the "climber" started up the ladder while it was still canted the wrong way and reached the top safely just as his mates got it settled against the bar. They did it in the fast time of 12 and one fifth seconds.

Charlottetown took second in this event in 13 and three-fifths seconds with Amherst picking up its only point of the cup meet with third place.

The Island team also took a second in the hose reel race in the good-time of 50 and three fifths seconds, just one second behind Lunenburg and 10 seconds faster than Moncton.

CAR ACCIDENTS COSTLY

MONTREAL (CP) — Denis C. Wilson, a brokerage company director, says car accidents between 1954 and 1958 cost more than Canada's share of the St. Lawrence Seaway. A total of \$72,000,000 was paid out by Canadian insurance companies on car claims during the four-year period. The under-25-year old driver accounted for almost 30 per cent of accidents, he said in an address to a driver-instruction class.
