AID TO NEWFOUNDLAND'S AGRICULTURE

Various steps have been taken during the past year by the Canada Department of Agriculture for the promotion of agriculture in Newfoundland. Many are related to the control of plant and animal diseases and insects, inspection and grading of farm products and soil studies. The sum of \$251,160 was paid in freight assistance on the moving of 12,564 tons of feed grain to Newfoundland and about \$2,000 will be paid toward meeting the cost of agricultural limestone transportation. Officers of the Marketing Service, at Ottawa, and of the Department of Natural Resources, at St. John, are planning a survey of marketing of farm products on the Island.
