MONSTER HUNT SAID PERILOUS

MOSCOW (Reuters) — Groups of Russians planning to search for a pre-historic monster said to live in a remote Siberian lake have been warned off by the Russian newspaper Sovetskaya Rossiya.

One person already has been killed on such an expedition, the newspaper says, and it advised the would-be seekers not to spend time, money and health on such a venture.

The monster, said to be like a giant sea serpent with a long neck and dark blue skin, was "discovered" by a local biologist in Lake Khalyr in far northern Yakutia.

Local fishermen were quick to back up the story. But scientists who investigated the reports said there were not enough fish in the lake to feed what might be a rival to Scotland's legendary Loch Ness monster.

OTTAWA (CP) — A bill that would allow magistrates to prohibit persons convicted of animal cruelty from owning or possessing animals or birds for a stated period of time was introduced in the Commons Friday by Barry Mather (NDP—New Westminster). He said such an amendment to the Criminal Code has long been sought by the Ontario Humane Society.

The bill was given routine first reading.

Catholic Women Object To Discrimination Of Church

AURORA, Ont. (CP) — Two Roman Catholic women are working to combat what they consider discrimination against women by the church.

Catholic women cannot be lecturers or servers, cannot sing in cathedral choirs or be ordained as priests. In addition, say Catherine Beaton of Toronto and Cecilia Wallace of Aurora, in direct and indirect ways church teachings hold women generally inferior, subjected to men and unworthy of the priesthood.

"The church will argue that it has raised the status of woman by saying she is equal before God," Mrs. Beaton says. "That is true, but we're left with an Orwellianism. Everyone is equal, but some are more equal than others."

The women have formed a Canadian chapter of St. Joan's Alliance, an international group which has worked with the United Nations against child marriage, forced marriages, for equal pay and for equal working opportunities for women in public administration.

Miss Wallace says she hopes the alliance can attack the problem through research on the effects of discrimination on women with a view to changing attitudes of prejudice. She doesn't expect a huge membership, but hopes the alliance will grow across the country.

GAINING STATUS

Miss Wallace, a secretary at the Centre of Ecumenical Studies, St. Michael's College, has done historical research on the status of women for several years.

Mrs. Gary Beaton is a housewife with four young children. Both women say they want to avoid being shrilly feminist. They acknowledge a new tendency among some Roman Catholic theologians to consider women as equals and possible candidates for priesthood.

But they also cite remarks from two Catholic books on theology published in North America in recent years.

"The reason . . . for denying women the right to teach is a reason that is absolute and uni-

versal, based as it is on the natural condition of inferiority and subjection that is the portion of women. . . ." (Father Immanuel Doronzo in Sacrament of Orders).

"Glee, envy and vengeance and jealousy are prevalently female faults. . . ." (Father Willibald Dermal, Pastoral Psychology in Practice).

AUTHORITIES CITED

The women object to women being regarded solely as mothers, not as women, and to an attitude that the woman who is a mother has automatically higher status than the woman who is not.

The two women have found that St. Paul and St. Thomas Aquinas are quoted (most often in arguments about woman's role. They say the men are often misquoted and even when they are not, it should be remembered that they spoke in specifics of another time and other areas.

Mrs. Beaton compares the position of women in the church with that of the Negro in the southern United States.

"Nobody says to the Negro, 'Why do you want to be equal?' When women say they want to be equal, men say 'Why?'"

"It seems incongruous to me that priests will carry placards asking equality for some oppressed groups and then return to their classrooms and teach that woman is naturally subordinate to man."

"I don't doubt their sincerity, but I think if they really grasped the principle involved they would extend it to all of humanity. The men of the church have traditionally assigned to God the prejudices they themselves have."

Dad's Delmonico Roast Carved As He Likes It

"Choose what meat you like most for your birthday dinner," Mom said to Dad.

Like countless good trenchermen throughout the land, he chose roast beef, a n easy-to-carve Rib Eye Delmonico Roast, that Dad carved in the thick slices he liked. But Mom said never a word as she thought, "It's his birthday after all."

Measurements are level

RIB EYE (DELMONICO) ROAST

(Serves for 2 meals for 6 persons)

4- to 6 lb. beef rib eye (Delmonico) roast

2 tsp. salt

4 tsp. pepper

For garnish: 6 lemon cups with Cranberry-Orange Relish

Place roast fat-side up, on rack in open roasting pan. Season with salt and pepper. Insert meat thermometer so bulb reaches center of thickest part, be sure it does not rest in fat. Do not add water. Do not cover.

Roast in mod. oven (350 degrees F.). The meat thermometer will register 140 degrees F. for rare; 160 degrees F. for medium; 170 degrees F. for well-done. Allow 18 to 20 min. per lb. for rare, 20 to 22 min. for medium-well, and 22 to 44 min. for well-done.

Place meat on heated platter. Garnish with lemon cups filled with Cranberry-Orange Relish.

To Make Lemon Cups: Cut 3 medium-sized lemons in half with zigzag (sawtooth) cut. Remove pulp and keep fousane another day. Drain lemon halves. Fill with cranberry-orange relish. Serve with rib eye roast.

Green Soy Beans Saladettes

Baked Stuffed Fish Fillets, any kind, with Drawn Butter Sauce, Whipped Potato and Oven-Browned Quartered Parsnips—Warm Bread-and-Butter Pudding—Coffee, Tea, Milk.

GREEN SOY BEAN SALADETTES

1 (1 lb.) can green soy beans

2 c. fine-diced celery

1 diced large firm tomato (optional)

1-3 c. garlic French dressing

Garnish: shredded lettuce or curly chicory

Drain soy beans. Save liquid; add when making any meal or vegetable soup. To beans, add celery and tomato if used. With fork, stir in garlic dressing. Refrigerate 30 min. Garnish: lettuce or chicory.

THE CHEF EXPLAINS

Mesdames: Meat should be salted and seasoned before roasting, because salt tends to seal in the juices, as it roasts, and so helps retain natural flavors. If seasoned after roasting, the seasonings remain on the outside of the meat, some of the juices are lost, and it is insufficiently seasoned.

Actress Loretta Young Says Figures She Has Done 'Stint'

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "If I never act again, I figure I've done my stint."

The speaker was Loretta Young, still every inch the movie star, but refusing to conform to the entertainment-world maxim that the show must go on, and on.

She lives not in the movie-star belt of Beverly Hills and Bel Air but in a quiet neighborhood of apartments and modest homes in West Hollywood, just below the bustling Sunset Strip. The exterior is not grand by Hollywood standards, but the inside exhibits tasteful, lived-in elegance.

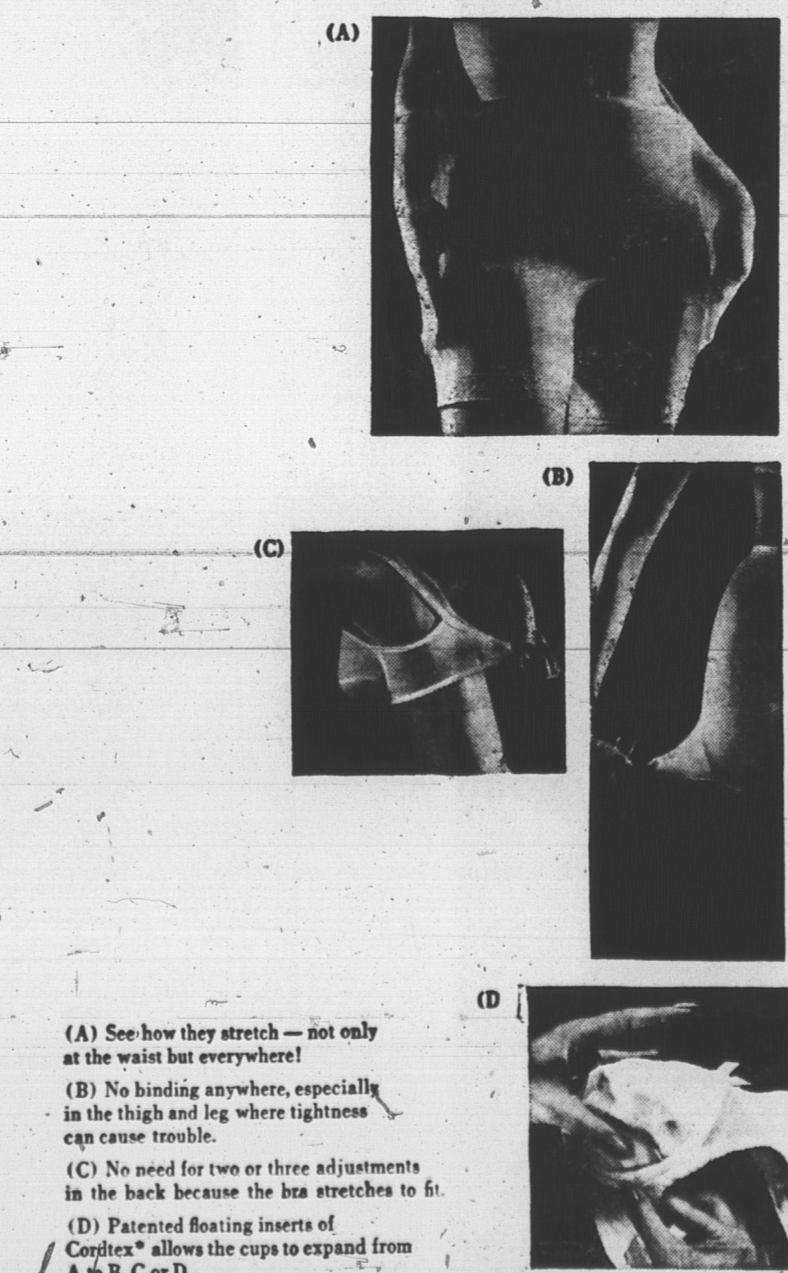
Loretta Young herself displayed her flair as she swept

into the living room, not unlike her famed entrances on television, in a silk flowered top over pink capris. Even in repose she can give the impression of being terribly busy.

"I honestly have trouble finding the time to do all the things I'd like to do," she admitted.

Yet she hasn't acted since three years ago, when her second television series ended after a brief run. Her explanation: "I haven't liked the things that they (the producers) have offered, and they haven't liked the things that I've offered. So we're at an impasse."

But that's all right. I don't feel any compulsive drive to be acting again. I've been doing it since I was 12 years old and



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
