Argyll and Sutherland Band to be Hosts to Princess and Duke



The visit to Canada of Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh gives a famous Canadian regiment the chance to repay the hospitality shown them by the Royal Family while in Scotland this past summer. Her Royal Highness, as Colonel-in-Chief, will be the guest of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders at a tea party to be held in Hamilton, Ontario, this week-end. The unit which is now commanded by Lieut. Col. J. A. Farmer, D.S.O., E.D., was once commanded in action by Lieut. Col. J. D. Stewart, D.S.O., of this city. Col. Stewart and Mrs. Stewart were invited to attend the party for the Princess. They were guests of Princess Elizabeth at a tea at Balmoral famous Scottish ancestral home of Queen Elizabeth and took the opportunity of amusing young Prince Charles by letting him try on a Buzzy. Mrs. O'Regan Addresses Liberal Women's Club

Mrs. W. T. O'Regan, president of the National Federation of Liberal Women in Canada, speaking before a luncheon gathering at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday, declared emphatically that she is against price controls, and urged women to take care in the quality rather than the quantity of articles they buy, in order to fight the threat of inflation.

She said that women who buy quality save in the long run, and urged that children be taught a sense of value and private control be exercised as measures more effective than controls in the battle against inflation.

Mrs. O'Regan, introduced by Mrs. George Inman, president of the P. E. I. Liberal Women's Organization, carried greetings to women's groups in the Maritimes from Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent. Although it is her first visit here, Mrs. O'Regan's influence has been widely felt, and she commented with pleasure upon the strength of women's organizations here and in Nova Scotia, which she visited before coming here.

Mrs. O'Regan said that "every Liberal woman on Prince Edward Island has a duty to perform"—to know the party, to see that she has a voice in the choosing of candidates, and once candidates are chosen, to give them whole hearted support. She urged them to "be proud of being a Liberal and try to make it contagious," commented upon the social welfare legislation introduced under the Liberal Government and concluded with an appeal to Liberal women to get behind the party.

Mrs. O'Regan, whose husband is a graduate of St. Dunstan's University, was born in Montreal and started her political career at seventeen, at a time when women's suffrage had not become a reality, and women in politics had to be content with a minor role.

Prominent At Ottawa For many years a leading figure in the Ontario Women's Liberal Association and well known across Canada as an organizer, Mrs. O'Regan has been president of the Lady Laurier Liberal Club in Ottawa since she founded it in 1936, is treasurer, following a term as secretary of the East Ottawa Riding Association, and is also the only woman vice president of the Ontario Liberal Association. That such a crowded and successful career has not prevented her from being a capable wife and mother is ample evidence of her ability.

Speaking briefly after Mrs. O'Regan's address, Hon. A. W. Matheson, acting Premier, praised the work of the women's organization in the Province, and advised that they, in order to make their influence felt, must get on the committees which choose the delegates to nominating conventions.

Literature And Life

WALT WHITMAN

Many years ago I made the habit of noting on the last page of a book read the date on which the reading ended, and I find by referring to my copy of Whitman's "Leaves of Grass" that I read the book four times. I have always maintained that a book worth reading should be read twice at least. For a long time I thought that Whitman was not worth spending time on, but after reading him once I saw that there was more in him than I had imagined. Some critics place him high among American poets.

He was born in 1819 and spent his boyhood in Brooklyn and New York. For a while he edited the Brooklyn Eagle. He travelled widely in the U.S.A., followed the army of the North in the Civil War, tended the wounded as a voluntary nurse without pay. His health was undermined by his war services and he died in 1892.

Nearly all his poetry is written as free verse, but such pieces as "Captain, My Captain" show that he could have written using ordinary rhyme.

Much of his work is crude, but there is also pure gold. Very touching is the way he takes leave of the world. "This is done in a poem—So Long. In referring to his Leaves of Grass, he says: "Camerado, this is no book. Who touches this touches a man."

That is true and that is the secret of all poetry or art that shall live. There must be what Wordsworth calls the still and music of humanity, what Sir Joshua Reynolds called "That".

His poetry is human, steeped in life. Take the line, "Many a soldier's kiss dwells on these beaded lips." Reminding one of Mrs. Brown's line: "The kiss my mother left there when she died."

How touching is the little poem about a dead soldier buried "neath a tree! The title is "As 'Toilsome I Wandered Virginia's Woods". On a tablet nailed to the tree were these words: "Bold, cautious, true, and my loving comrade." The army marched on and left the grave.

He was a great democrat and visualized a great America, dreamt of one hundred million. It has gone past that now by nearly fifty millions.

I have always liked his lines on Brooklyn Ferry. Night on the Prairies has a line which reminds one of Blanco White's sonnet on Night and Death. Whitman says: "I was thinking the day most splendid till I saw what the next day exhibited"; and White says in his sonnet that day conceals the stars and life may conceal what death may disclose.

In his Lincoln poem he serenades death thus: "Come lovely and soothing death Undulate round the world, serenely arriving, arriving In the day, in the night, to all, to each, Sooner or later delicate death. Over the tree-tops I float thee a song."

He saw the effects of war and he hated it. "Silent cannon, soon to cease your silence, Soon unnumbered to begin the red business."

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Strange But True

The teeth of a monkey are the same in number, but less regular than those of a man, which, of course, is 32 in all.

It was not until 1875 that a known living gorilla was brought to Europe, although as early as 1860 a travelling showman in England possessed one of these animals, though he thought it was a chimpanzee.

A coconut can float on the water for week on end without suffering any damage. Why? Because it has a thick shell which resists sea-water. Coconuts have been known to make long sea voyages and when thrown up on some warm shore and dried by the sun the embryo will push out through the soft pore at the upper end, and to a new coconut palm will start to grow!

Ever hear of the explosive fruits? No! Well, there are a number of which I shall mention but a few.

Gorse, wood sorrel, and certain members of the pea family. The construction of such "explosive" fruits is simply amazing. They split their skins with the result that the seeds are actually hurled some distance. In the case of wood sorrel, each seed is embedded in a fleshy cushion which contracts when the seeds are ripe and ready to pop. The explosive fruits of the Sand-box Tree of South America are so solidly made that when they burst, they give off a noise like a gun shot and hurl their seed as far as 30 yards.

At the North Pole there is little spring or autumn. Liquid air can be put into a kettle and boiled on ice.

Cleopatra's Needle, which stands on the banks of the Thames River, near Charing Cross Bridge, is about 3,500 years old. It was brought to its present place from Egypt in 1878.

There's a popular notion to the effect that the dragon-fly has a vicious sting. Don't believe it! This fly is quite harmless. It has no sting.

The Torch Thistle grows to a height of 60 feet, and like the camel, can go without water for long periods.
