

THE TRAGEDY AT SHERWOOD CEMETERY.

Further Evidence Taken at the Inquest.

A Reward of \$1,000 offered for the Murderers.

We are pleased to learn that the Local Government will issue a proclamation offering a handsome reward of \$1,000 for information that will lead to the conviction of the person or persons who actually murdered the Keeper of Sherwood Cemetery.

John A. Longworth testified:—I went to the Cemetery on Sunday afternoon, I entered by the lower gate, and noticed a wheelbarrow, some garden tools, a basket and a line in the garden. I also noticed the back door of the Cemetery cottage was closed.

On Tuesday I drove out again to see that if the sodding I ordered him to do some time previous was not done, I would get another man to do it. On reaching the ground I found he had done nothing. I drove down to his house and found the rear door open, and the inside door was ajar.

On Tuesday I knocked as loud as I could, and sang out, receiving no answer. Looking inside the door, I noticed a half dozen potato sets, which were dried up and evidently had been out some days before. This led me to believe the old man was sick or away.

To a juror—I did not notice a chain attached to the watch. Patrick Callaghan, deceased, very well. He was of strictly temperate habits. I did not know much about his financial affairs.
