PAQUET INQUEST ADJOURNED—Inquest into the death of Bert Paquet, 51-year-old engineer whose body was found two weeks ago in a roadside hotel was further adjourned yesterday when Coroner W. B. Howatt was informed that analysis of the contents of the railroad man's stomach and other organs had not been completed. The organs had been sent to Saint John, N. B., for examination when the first session of Paquet's life before he was found dead. Coroner Howatt said last night he believed the engineer had died of natural causes.

The death occurred in the Prince Edward Island Hospital Wednesday morning of William Kaneen, aged 80, of New Perth. Mr. Kaneen had been several weeks ago and had been a patient in the hospital for the past two weeks. He was a son of the late John Kaneen, of New Perth, and was engaged in farming for many years until advancing age compelled his retirement. The loss of his residence by a fire a number of years ago was a heavy blow to him. Mr. Kaneen was a man of high intelligence, had a philosophic turn of mind, was fond of reading and a lover of good literature, especially poetry. He wrote many poems himself. He was unmarried and is survived by his wife and three children in the province and elsewhere. The funeral will take place from the residence of his nephew, Russell Gordon, Head of Cardigan, probably on Saturday at 2 p. m. He will be buried in Georgetown cemetery.
