PRINCE OF WALES' ACCIDENT.

Lord Rothschild's Statement.

Baron Rothschild thus described the accident: I was in my dressing room when I was informed that the prince had met with an accident. He was going down to breakfast by the west stair case when his foot slipped off the edge of one of the steps, severely twisting the tendons of one knee. His servant assisted him down the remaining steps to the west gallery where he complained of great pain.

"I was immediately summoned, and found him sitting down, evidently suffering severely, but quite patient.

"Fortunately a trained nurse was in the house attending a relative of mine who is an invalid, and she supplied remedies while the village doctor was being sent for.

"The doctor arrived in about a quarter of an hour, and, having examined the prince's knee, enjoined complete rest. The doctor bandaged it up and the prince lay down until the afternoon, during which time the swelling increased, but the pain gradually subsided.

"The prince was then taken in an invalid chair to the carriage and was driven several miles to Aylesbury, where he took a special train to London. He never complained, his only anxiety being about the possibility of the accident interfering with the fulfilment of his many public engagements to which his time is so largely devoted.

"Dr. Shaw, who attended the Prince at Waddesdon, declared that he must rest at all costs, but that with his powerful constitution he should hope to be all right in a short time.

"It was a most disagreeable termination to a very pleasant visit. Fortunately the injury was not serious, but it is troublesome, and in view of the Prince's extremely active habits, the enforced rest is certain to be very irksome to him."

SCENE OF THE ACCIDENT.

The staircase on which the prince met with his mishap is one of two sweeping circular staircases, one at each end. The Waddesdon stairs are carpeted with thick, deep red felt. It appears that the prince was looking at the charming view out of the windows as he descended and so missed his footing. The staircases are modelled on those of the Chateau of Chenonceaux, and are considered the most beautiful examples of architecture of the kind in England.

Waddesdon itself is a creation of Baron Ferdinand Rothschild, the house being a reproduction of the French sixteenth century chateau. It is situated on a lofty hill overlooking a lovely wooded park of 4,000 acres, the whole laid out and planted with wonderful taste at an enormous outlay under the Baron's direction. The house is not only stored with art treasures, but it is marked by the perfection of decorative taste, so that it is one of the show places of England.

It was visited by Queen Victoria a few years ago, and the Prince of Wales always goes there twice a year.

Local and Other Items.

HIRED OVER AGAIN.—The entire crew of the steamer Halifax were discharged yesterday and re-engaged.—Halifax Herald.

THEATRICAL.—The Miles Ideal Stock Company opened at the Academy of Music, Halifax, on Thursday night, playing to "standing room only" in some parts of the hall.

EXCURSION.—The Stellarton Band excursion arrived about one o'clock. There are about 100 excursionists. A cricket match at the park takes place this afternoon.

AT CHARLOTTETOWN.—The M. P. A. A. executive has decided to hold the championship games at Charlottetown, Sept. 8. The executive is to be complimented upon their choice.

FROM HALIFAX.—The City of Ghent arrived from Halifax about three o'clock yesterday afternoon and left on return this morning at four. She had a snug passenger list both ways, and an unusually large outward cargo.

CANADIAN HAMS.—The Montreal French Chamber of Commerce has written a letter to the Minister of Commerce at Paris concerning the curing of Canadian hams with borax, and asking that such hams be allowed to enter France in the future, for consumption, after being freed of the borax that is necessary to enable them to keep during the ocean voyage.

SCHOOL OF EQUITATION.—Arrangements are being made for the opening of a School of Equitation at Charlottetown, probably on the exhibition grounds. The school will open on the 13th September, and will continue for about twenty-eight days. It will be for officers only. Six horses and instructors with an officer in command are to be brought from the Royal Canadian Dragoons, Toronto. The school is now being carried on at St. John.

PARADE AT THE PARK.—The two City Companies of Artillery and the Engineer Corps were paraded at Victoria Park yesterday evening where they were inspected by Sir Louis Davies, who was recently appointed Honorary Colonel. The men presented a fine soldierly appearance and went through the various movements in a splendid manner. At the close of the exercises Colonel Davies made an address in the course of which he complimented the three companies upon their excellent appearance and expressed his appreciation of the honor done him when he was made Honorary Colonel of the Fourth Regiment.

PATENT REPORT.—On July 12 the United States Patent Office issued 410 patents, 39 design patents; 17 trade marks, 2 labels and 1 re-issue. Out of this number 395 were granted to citizens of the United States; 20 to citizens of England and 7 to Canadian inventors as follows:—
