Steel Arrives From Holland For New Wharf At Geo'town

The motor ship "Barbard Broham" of the North American Lines, twelve hundred registered tons, with port of registry, Antwerp, Belgium, under the command of Captain Fritz Wieler and with a crew of twenty four men, docked at Georgetown Tuesday afternoon from Holland.

The unloading of approximately 800 tons of steel to be used by the Diamond Construction Company in the New Dominion Government wharf at Georgetown, is expected to take about one week. A part of this cargo is assigned to the Provincial Government for the Department of Highways. She will then proceed to Quebec and Montreal where the balance of her cargo will be unloaded. En route to Georgetown, she made a call at Portsmouth, England.

Veteran harbor pilot Temple Goulet guided the Broham to her berth.
