Que. Health Minister Backs Walter Gordon In New Book

MONTREAL (CP)—Eric Kierans, who recently sparked controversy over United States economic policies, says that if Walter Gordon, former federal finance minister, were re-appointed to the present cabinet, federal leadership would be strengthened.
Mr. Kierans, now Quebec's minister of health, reviews Mr. Gordon's new book, "A Choice for Canada," in Saturday's Montreal Star.
"A Canadian identity depends on the quality of federal leadership," writes Mr. Kierans, whose name is signed to the article without mention of his ministerial status.
"If Mr. Gordon were reappointed to the present federal cabinet, it would be strengthened. We cannot accept his economic nationalism, but his spirit and his concern for Canada are sorely needed."
Mr. Kierans caused much discussion when he protested the guidelines set down by the United States last December for the foreign subsidiaries of U.S. firms.
The guidelines were designed to improve the U.S. balance-of-payments position.
Mr. Kierans, a former Quebec

Winters Claims No Control Over Profit-Sharing Plan

OTTAWA (CP)—Trade Minister Winters said here he has no personal control over a deferred profit sharing plan worth nearly half a million dollars which was established for him when he left the board chairmanship of wealthy Rio Algom Mines Ltd. last winter.
The company, during the eight years he was its chairman under a contract of employment, bought insurance policies to discharge its obligation to provide for his retirement. When he left the firm last year, these policies had a cash surrender value of \$316,627.
This amount, plus another \$182,373 which the company charged to its 1966 operating expenses, was put into the deferred profit sharing plan for his benefit. The trustees handle the investment so he can be independent of his former business connections, he said in an interview.
The story of the establishment of the fund for Mr. Winters was told in Rio Algom's latest prospectus, issued March 24 when the company offered the public \$15,000,000 worth of preferred stock. It said:
"Because Mr. Winters was to accept public office, it was considered desirable that he be released from his employment contract.
"Since the complete termination of his employment contract resulted in the loss of Mr. Winters' earned early retirement benefits, and in order that he be not penalized in this respect, an amount was paid to Mr. Winters as a retiring allowance which was the equivalent of the cash surrender value of the insurance policies plus an additional sum of \$182,373 calculated to provide Mr. Winters with retirement benefits approximately equal to those that he would have been entitled to if he had continued in the employment of the company to his retirement age as provided by his employment contract."
"Mr. Winters subsequently paid the full amount received by him to trustees of a deferred profit sharing plan for his benefit and the trustees in turn purchased the stock."
