**THE NATIONAL FLAG.**

The displaying of a "Union Jack" on a small scale in Ottawa has caused some comment in the very limited circle who are acquainted with flag-ology, as it has fancifully been termed, says the Free Press of that city in discussing the matter. The conditions governing the use of the "Union Jack" are precisely laid down in the King's Regulations, and they are too long to quote in full. But it is curious to note that doubt as to its use and also as to what is exactly the national flag of Britain seems to exist in the very heart of the Empire itself, and the London Times is now in the throes of a controversy on the subject. The discussion arose out of an incident which occurred at the recent great Naval Review after the King's coronation. There lay at anchor during the ceremonies the Foudroyant, an old line of battleship of eminent renown. Not, however, the famous vessel of that name which serves as Nelson's flagship, and on which the Neapolitan Prince Caraccioli was tried by court martial previous to his execution on a Neapolitan frigate. This ship, it will be remembered, which was closely associated with the painful events which marked the reputation of the "mighty seaman" in his relations with Lady Hamilton was wrecked near Liverpool not long ago and had to be broken up. The present Foudroyant is now in private hands, and on the day of the review the owner, who uses it as a museum, displayed the Union Jack, but was quickly ordered to take it in, as it was contrary to the King's Regulations for a ship which did not belong to the navy to fly that particular flag. The discussion which has been going on for several weeks seems to show that England has no one national flag for all occasions, although the Jack appears in all of the ensigns. At sea, however, the red ensign is used by merchant ships, the white ensign by men-of-war and the blue ensign by naval reserve ships, but the Union Jack is restricted to the jackstaff of men-of-war. But the incident has provoked a most voluminous correspondence which seems to indicate that much doubt exists as to what the national flag really is. Lord Hawkesbury, a naval officer, writes to assert that the Union Jack is "no more the national flag than the German Jack or those of Sweden and Norway. The red ensign is, of course, the national flag, and is recognized as such the world over." A "R. N. captain" waxes very wroth over this, and denies that the red ensign is anything more than a mercantile flag. And so the controversy progresses. In Canada the function of the red and blue ensigns charged with the clumsy so-called heraldic combination, seems to be correctly understood, and subject to improvement, fairly reflects the position and sentiment of the people of the Dominion.

**ECLIPSE OF THE MOON.**

The chief astronomical event of October is the total eclipse of the moon, which will occur on the night of October 16-17. The passage of the moon through the earth's shadow produces a spectacle of great interest, greater as a spectacle, however than in its scientific importance. The time of mid eclipse agrees with the time of full moon within a few minutes.
