NEW YORK

NEW YORK (AP)—The high-fliers of the stock market went on a rampage Monday as the list enjoyed one of its sharpest rallies of the year and extended its recovery drive through the fourth straight session.
Trading was only moderately active over-all, with 7,270,000 shares traded compared with 6,460,000 Friday.
The blue chip section of the market made substantial progress as reflected by an advance of 6.29 in the Dow Jones industrial average which closed at 629.17. But this was as nothing compared with the big leaps made by the color televisions.

The death occurred at the Kings County Memorial Hospital, Montague on Tuesday, Jan. 18, 1966, of Malcolm A. Matheson, Heatherdale, in his sixtieth year.

MONTEAL

MONTEAL (CP)—Stocks rallied at the close Monday moving slightly higher on Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges.
Although the composite index rose 0.88 at 157.01, advances edged declines 5 to 64.
Industrial volume was 235,600 shares and mines and oils 941,400. This compared with 293,000 and 1,296,000 Friday.
Senior metals led the upward trend. In the base section, Falconbridge jumped 1 1/2 points to 101 1/2 and International Nickel 1 1/4 points to 105 1/2. Hollinger and Noranda added 1/4 to 25 and 51 1/4. Among primary issues, Aluminum climbed 1/4 to 37 1/4.
The industrial index rose 1.27 at 164.09.
Papers rallied at the close advancing 0.26 at 123.25. MacMillan, Blodgett and Powell River added 3/4 to 27 1/4 and Great Lakes 1/4 to 25 1/4.
Banks were off 0.24 at 120.87. Provincial dropped two points to 46 and Montreal 1/4 to 60 1/4. Utilities declined 0.04 at 148.32. Quebec Telephone slipped 1/2 points to 24 1/4 and B.C. Telephone 1/4 to 73.
Senior oils moved higher, with Imperial climbing 1/4 to 52 1/4. Speculative mines and oils were up. Phoenix Canadian jumped 10 cents to \$2.90 and Midessa 25 cents to \$4.05. Inspiration added 20 cents to \$1.90.

TORONTO (CP)—Stocks continued their upward trend on the Toronto Stock Exchange Monday, advancing for the fourth consecutive session. A total of 5,776,000 shares were traded, compared with 4,426,000 Friday.
In the industrial list, Atlantic Sugar and Union Gas climbed 1/2 to 29 and 32 1/4. Jefferson Lake 3/4 to 31 1/4, Inglis 1/4 to 10 and Wainwright 60 cents to 3.90.
Speculative mines and oils traded heavily with D'Eldon up 27 cents to 1.39 on 773,500 shares, Place 35 cents to 2.30 on 160,000 shares and Spooner 10 cents to 1.05 on 323,000. American Leduc dropped 2 to 21 cents on 533,000 shares.
Among western oils, Dome added 1/4 at 14 1/4. Great Plains 1/4 at 12 1/4, Banff 1/4 at 17 1/4 while Scurry Rainbow lost 1/4 to 21 1/4.
INCO gained 1 1/4.
Inco paced base metals, gaining 1 1/2 to 100 1/2. Denison and Falconbridge added 3/4 to 4 1/4 and 10 1/4 and Rio Algom 1/4 to 20 1/4.
Golds were the only major group to decline as Kerr-Addison dipped 1/4 to 10 1/4. Giant Yellowknife was up 1/4 to 12 1/4.
On index, industrials were up 81 to 166 1/2, base metals 87 to 38.07, and the TSE 74 to 157.70. Western oils were unchanged at 106.82 while golds fell 2.04 to 164.25.

Pope's Action Is Applauded

NEW YORK (AP)—Protest antileaders in the United States applauded Pope Paul's action here in easing Roman Catholic rules on mixed marriages. They saw the step as mollifying a long-standing cause of friction. "A great step forward in eccumenical relationships," said Rev. A. Dale Piers, of Indianapolis, Ind., executive secretary of the Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ).
The changes eliminate the requirement that non-Catholic partners in marriages to Roman Catholics sign written promises to raise children as Catholics.
"Non-Romans everywhere will welcome the papal announcement," said Rt. Rev. John E. Hines, presiding bishop of the Protestant Episcopal (Anglican) Church.
Methodist Bishop Prince A. Taylor, of Princeton, N.J., president of the Methodist Council of Bishops, called the action "a step forward, one I had hoped for many years."
Calling the changes "a most welcome development," Rev. Robert C. Dodds, director of eccumenical affairs for the U.S. National Council of Churches, said the change reduces tensions and encourages development of sensitive conscientiousness among all who participate in mixed marriages.

APPROVE FOREIGN AID

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson has signed a bill authorizing \$415,000,000 of foreign aid funds for South Viet Nam and other world trouble spots. The White House said Saturday the measure also authorizes additional aid for Laos, Thailand and the Dominican Republic with most of the money—\$275,000,000—going to South Viet Nam.
