Tomorrow being election day and the courtroom being given for the purpose of polling and owing to the necessary absence of counsel, the court stands adjourned till Friday at 9.30 a. m.

The petit jurors were notified not to attend until that day.

SCOTT ACT CAMPAIGN.

Last Night's Meeting in the Market Hall.

The Rev. J. Gillis opened last night's meeting with prayer, after which the Rev. Dr. McLeod was called and made an excellent speech. He first made reference to the letter in last night's EXAMINER from Mr. Bremner, in which he pointed out that he must have been misunderstood as he never said the rich did not drink, but the fact was that they did and got drunk too, but they would be carried home in a coach while the poor fellow would pull up in the lockup. Neither did he think Mr. Bremner had any argument in the statement that a license Act would give better liquor, as it did not make any difference, men got drunk on good as well as bad liquor. They may want to abolish the bad liquor but they get drunk on the licensed and good liquor all the same. It has been proved that instead of decreasing the sale by selling the "good liquor" it increased it.

He hoped it was true, as he had been informed, that P. E. I. would never enact a license law again.

He deprecated the fact that some cowardly men refused to vote Scott Act because it might affect their business. If he was not a Christian, nor a believer in God nor temperance, he would fight the liquor traffic from a business standpoint.

Don't be fooled, don't be lulled, but vote right on the 22nd. He would like to be with them to the close but feared he must leave for home as he had not been able to talk since he came on account of throat trouble. He hoped they would poll a good vote and come off victors.

The Rev. J. Gillis made a brief practical address in which he showed the effect of the Act on the rural districts and said the moral tone of the community he came from was getting better and better since the Scott Act in Charlottetown. He illustrated his points showing the effect of intemperance on the body, mind, morals, and finances of the community. He said there were 300 ruined every year by the direct influence of the traffic on the island and at least 700 by the indirect influence.

Mr. Spence spoke next and delivered a most convincing speech showing the position of the Episcopal, Pre-bbyterian, Baptist and Catholic Churches on the great question. His reference to the growth and resources of the country, the effect on the Dominion by the labour of the workmen, miners, fishermen, lumbermen, farmers, etc., and the opposite effect on the country by the liquor sellers, was wonderfully impressive. The liquor seller is not a producer but a parasite sucking the life blood from the nation. He showed how the liquor law never was enforced no matter what kind we had. The Scott Act has been better enforced than any other law but those engaged in the traffic never would abide by law.

His illustrations of regulating a mad dog by law were very amusing while they were very convincing. It is impossible to give any idea by a report of this excellent address. Few will forget the final remarks on the crucifixion of the one in the minority. "I would rather stand weeping with crucified truth than howl with the crucifying rabble, while this one is known the world over not a name is remembered of the mob."

There will be a meeting this evening in Grace church, when Mr. Spence will again speak on the subject.

HON. D. FARQUHARSON AND THE FOUNTAIN.

ATTEMPTED SUICIDE.—The Guardian correspondent at Summerside reports that Mr. Alfred Oatway, an old resident of St. Eleanor's, attempted to commit suicide Sunday morning but was prevented. He had been in poor health for some time.

FOR SCOTT ACT.—"One dollar from a 17 year old boy who wishes to aid the manly men of Charlottetown in putting temptation out of the way of other boys as well as his own." This note and money have been received by the finance committee of the Scott Act.

PROMENADE CONCERT.—The first of the series of promenade concerts promoted by Reddin Bros. the popular druggists, was given last evening. The League of the Cross Band occupied the stand, and rendered an excellent programme. The attendance of citizens was very large.

RESUMED WORK.—The steamship Northumberland, which was on the slip at Pictou last week having her bottom scraped and painted, resumed her trips on the Point du Cneve and Summerside route yesterday morning. Awnings have been placed over the steamer's after deck and the promenades on both sides. This will make a trip by this popular steamer more enjoyable than ever, and the most pleasant way imaginable to spend one of these hot summer days.

INQUEST LAST NIGHT.—An inquest was last evening held in view of the body of John Belcham, particulars of whose death were given in THE EXAMINER yesterday. Officers Taylor and Campbell were the witnesses examined. The verdict of the jury was in effect that the deceased came to his death by taking Paris Green while labouring under a fit of temporary insanity. Officer Campbell found \$10.50 wrapped in a piece of paper in a table in Belcham's room and \$1.23 in a purse in the pocket of the deceased.

WAREHOUSE ENTERED.—The warehouse of Messrs Weeks & Warren, off Grafton Street, was entered by burglars last night. There were two locks on the door, one a padlock and the other a large old-style English lock. The padlock was forced open, and the larger lock was evidently opened with a skeleton key. The boots in the cases were strewn about the floor indicating that the thieves had been selecting the best stock. The firm do not know the extent of their loss. About a month ago the same warehouse was also visited with the same object in view. It is too bad that the guilty persons cannot be found out and punished as they deserve.

KING'S COUNTY ELECTION CASE

McIntyre vs. Macdonald. The election court opened at Georgetown this morning at 11 o'clock. Upon the request of counsel the court has adjourned until the 30th of September, and Mr. Justice Hodgson the presiding Judge intimated that no further adjournment of the case would be allowed unless for some good cause shown and supported by affidavit.

A By-Law Respecting Milk Vendors.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1. Every person publicly selling Milk in this City in or from any vehicle shall obtain from the Mayor thereof a License as a Milk Vendor and the Mayor is hereby authorized to issue such license upon receiving the License fee hereinafter mentioned.

2. The License fee for the present year 1897 and up to the Thirtieth day of April next shall be Fifteen dollars and shall be payable on the Twentieth day of August next and thereafter the said License fee shall be fifteen dollars per annum and shall be payable on the First day of May in each year.

3. The City Collector for the time being shall be and is hereby appointed Inspector of all Milk offered for sale in this City.

4. It shall and may be lawful for the said Inspector to examine and inspect all milk so offered for sale wherever the same may be offered.

5. It shall be the duty of every person keeping or offering Milk for sale whether on the streets or in shops or private dwellings to furnish to and permit the said Inspector to take samples thereof for examination or analysis, and any person hindering the said Inspector in the discharge of his duty, or refusing to permit him to examine and inspect or to take samples of such Milk, shall be deemed guilty of an offence against and incur the penalties of this By-Law.

6. It shall be the duty of the said Inspector whenever he has reason to believe any milk to be adulterated with water or any other substance to procure a sample thereof to be analysed and to prosecute all persons who may be found selling offering or keeping for sale any adulterated Milk.

7. No person shall expose for sale or sell anywhere in this City milk adulterated with water or with any deleterious substance.

8. No person shall expose for sale or publicly sell Milk in this City in or from any vehicle without having first obtained a License therefor in manner above mentioned.

9. Any person or persons guilty of any infraction of any of the provisions of this By-Law shall upon conviction in the City Court of the Stipendiary Magistrate on the oath or affirmation of any credible witness forfeit and pay at the discretion of the said Magistrate a penalty not exceeding the sum of Thirty dollars for each offence exclusive of costs and in default of payment thereof it shall and may be lawful for the said Magistrate to commit the offender or offenders to the Common Jail of the County of Queens County for any period not exceeding Thirty days unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid, provided always that nothing in this By-Law shall be construed to require persons selling milk in stores or from their private dwellings to take out the License above mentioned.
