General Telegraphic News

WINNIPEG, Feb. 12.—Hon Mr. Greenway has completed arrangements for the opening of an immigration office in the Maritime Provinces, Moncton being selected as the spot.

BOSTON, Feb. 12.—A committee on public service to-day reported a bill establishing the salary of the governor at \$10,000 a year.

LISBON, Feb. 12.—A dynamite bomb exploded in front of the Spanish Consulate here to-day, but no serious damage was done. It was undoubtedly the work of Anarchists.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—A despatch to the Times from Rio Janeiro declares another revolution is imminent in Brazil. Three members of the ministry have resigned. Pelotas, in the province of Rio Grande do Sul, is said to be in a state of open revolution against the government and a battle between troops and the populace is anticipated.

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—Additional cases of Russian typhoid fever were discovered this morning, making a total of 67 cases. It is now under treatment. This plague is regarded by the health department as a very serious matter, as immigrants from the infected steamer Massalia have circulated it freely about the city since their arrival, and there is no knowing how widely they may have spread the contagion. The victims of the disease, nearly all of whom are Russian and Polish Jews, are taken to the North Brothers Island Hospital.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The final funeral services over the remains of Rev. Chas. H. Spurgeon were held yesterday morning in the Metropolitan Tabernacle. The edifice was packed, every person present being dressed in mourning. The hymn, "Servant of God, Well Done," was sung by the assembly. Secretary Harold preached the funeral sermon. Immense crowds of people were gathered at various points along the route of the funeral procession to N. Wood. The procession was four miles long.

BERLIN, Feb. 12.—The Kreuz Zeitung says a wide spread Anarchist plot has been discovered by the police of this city. Recent fires in the palace at Koenigsburg are said to have been the work of Anarchists' agents.

HALIFAX, Feb. 12.—James Scott & Co., grocers and wine merchants, one of the oldest established firms in Halifax, have assigned; liabilities \$60,000.

PARIS, Feb. 12.—Advices from China to-day say that General Feng, Kiang has been executed at Tien Tsin for treason and having pledged himself to support French influence and in having become a Christian.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 12.—The police have discovered a Nihilist society at Paltava and have seized a quantity of Nihilist delusion and a printing press. The leaders were arrested after a desperate struggle.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The Standard says it hears that John Dillon was proposed as leader of the majority of the Irish parliamentary party, but his name was withdrawn because of the opposition of the McCarthyites indicated that they would not vote for him. The Standard also says it is informed that Redmond formally declined to negotiate a reunion unless Healy was expelled.

EDMONTON, Md., Feb. 12.—The Allan Line steamer Missouri will sail from New York, March 12, on a mission of mercy to Liban, on the Baltic Sea in northern Russia. T. M. Baker, of the Allan Line transportation, offered the steamer yesterday to W. C. Edgar, manager of the Northwestern Miller, to carry the 2,000 tons of food which have been collected for the famine stricken peasants of Russia. Late in the afternoon Mr Baker received a telegram from Mr. Edgar accepting the offer, which is equivalent to a contribution of \$20,000.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—A despatch from Penza, the capital of the government of that name in the southwestern part of what is known as Great Russia, says the thermometer registers 58 deg. below zero. Typhoid fever, smallpox and diphtheria are decimating the inhabitants. A quantity of grain for the famine sufferers has arrived, but it is impossible to distribute it in the surrounding country owing to the fact that nearly all the horses have been killed for food or sold. It is estimated that several million horses have been killed throughout the empire since the autumn. In the government of Samara, Saratov and Nijni and Novgorod the conditions are far worse than in Penza. In Charkov and Kozan typhoid fever is especially terrible in its ravages. The inhabitants are dying by hundreds. In the vicinity of Penza, 18,000 persons are daily fed by charity.

PARIS, Feb. 12.—Several newspapers of this city to-day publish a rumor that the Russian general, Von Hilsner, who it was said yesterday had shot himself in the head in the Hotel Louvre, was a victim of nihilists. The rumor has it that he was assassinated by a man who had been watching his movements for some time past.

MONTREAL, Feb. 12.—The agitation against live cattle imports is gaining strength. Following the Times, the Morning Post, which hitherto has been most friendly to Canada, says: "In the presence of the grave danger of the spread of disease to British herds the most obvious dictates of common sense say, 'Close the port of England.' We are spending millions of pounds to suppress disease among home animals, yet with inexplicable fatuity we leave the doors of our ports open to the entrance of live animals which make no difference to imports of dead meat nor raise home prices." Bell's Weekly Messenger, another general friend of Canada, indicates the seriousness of the present outlook and urges the public to support Mr. Chaplin if necessary to stop all imports of live cattle. The situation is one of grave peril to Canadian trade and the Canadian government may perhaps strengthen its position by promptly announcing a rigid quarantine against United States cattle entering British Columbia as well as the rest of Canada.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The Vienna correspondent of the Graphic writes: The destitution prevailing here is terrible. Thousands of skilled laborers are idle and starving through the operation of the American tariff. The destitution of the poor people of the city is increased by the influx from the provinces of large numbers of unemployed persons seeking work in this city. The total number of people idle in the city is estimated at 70,000. It is hoped that the anticipated building operations and government public works will improve the existing state of affairs.

Crapaud Carnival.

The Carnival at Victoria on Friday night last was a grand success, financially and otherwise. The storm the night previous prevented a great many from attending. The Summerside Band discoursed sweet music, and they deserve credit for coming through the almost impassable state of the roads. The subject for discussion last evening was, "Which is the greatest evil in the world, war or intemperance." After a lengthy discussion lasting two hours the house was divided on the question, a majority appearing in favor of intemperance being the greatest evil.

Peace in Ireland.

A REUNION OF THE FACTIONS VERY PROBABLE.
Mr. T. P. O'Connor says: The stillness of the Irish political atmosphere just at present indicates, we have reason to believe, the coming, or at least a belief in the coming of a reunion of the factions. The Irish are a little tired, and also a little ashamed of continuing a struggle, the cause for which no longer exists. The more rational members of the minority have altered the tone of their speeches, and no longer indulge in insults and calumnies. Whether there is to be permanent peace or not it is too early to state with confidence. But there is at present something in the nature of truce, and we are rejoiced to believe that the era of bitter personal re-entrancements is past.

Referring to the recent meeting of the McCarthyites, Mr. O'Connor says: "We never saw a gathering more serious, more under control. The speeches were listened to with unbroken attention, and debatable questions were talked over without unseasonable criticism. We asked several members the reason for this unanimity, and received from all the same answer in substance, namely, that it was the effect of the terrible lesson taught by the occurrence in committee room 15."

Sir Ambrose Shea, the Newfoundland leader who is governor of the Bahamas, has just been congratulated on the completion of cable communication between the islands and the mainland. The line is from Jupiter, Fla. to Nassau, the capital, and will be a decided advantage to the business interests of the islands. The work is largely due to the action of Sir Ambrose, whose administration of the island's affairs has been marked by a number of industrial movements the people will profit by. The experiment of putting a business man at the head of affairs has been a success in the Bahamas and might prove advantageous in others of the languid colonies of the Empire.
