

**Local and Other Items.**

STEAMER *Miramichi* sailed for Montreal this morning at 6 o'clock; *Hadj* arrived from Montreal with a cargo of general merchandise yesterday at noon.

WARD MEETING.—There will be a public meeting of the electors of Ward One held this evening as advertised in our paper to-day. The retiring Councillor, Wm. Murphy, Esq., we learn, will address the electors in reply to certain gentlemen who spoke at the private meeting held in the Ward last week in Mr. Murphy's absence. The gentlemen alluded to will, doubtless, attend the meeting this evening.

Mrs. ELIJAH PHILLIPS, while driving in the Royalty a few days ago, left her team standing on the road. It was immediately taken charge of by a couple of rough fellows, who, in driving the horse, abused him so badly that he is now almost useless. One of the fellows is now under arrest. It is to be hoped he will be well punished for his cruelty to a dumb animal and his abuse of another person's property.

A MISUNDERSTANDING.—We are informed that Mr. Larter and his family, with their ordinary luggage, were passed, free of charge, as per ticket from the Mayor of St. John. His goods coming from St. John afterwards, as freight, were duly charged for by the Intercolonial Railway, Steam Navigation Company, and P. E. I. Railway. No order was given by the Mayor of St. John for the free conveyance of the effects, and the P. E. I. Railway having paid the charges of the Intercolonial Railway and the Steam Navigation Company, consider itself entitled to collect the same upon the goods here.

FIRE WARDENS MEETING.—At a meeting of the Fire Wardens, held on Saturday evening last, the propriety of forming a Volunteer Company for the protection of furniture and merchandise in case of fire, was discussed. The Stipendiary Magistrate—who has been active in forwarding the movement—was requested to organize such a Company. Captain James M. Butcher was instructed to provide a quantity of rope to be passed through rings on moveable stakes to form a kind of barrier beyond or within which other than firemen or officers will be permitted to enter.

What I did say was "that it was impossible to put it on to that machine for 15 or 20 dollars, and you know it."

The money I pay for machines is all left in the Dominion, which is more than you can say. As to my personal expenses, I don't know as it is any of your business where or how I spend my time or money.

I am not aware that your old Sweepstakes took any prize at the Model Farm trial in 1875. But I do know that the little "Heathen Chinese" game you attempted to play there did not succeed. Suppose every man did sign his own name to your paper (which, by the way, I doubt), what of it?—There was only 36, all told. If there was any names published by me that would have objected, had I asked them, I don't know it. Should want better evidence than your word before I would believe it. I have individual certificates from most of them and, even if there is any, there are at least two ready and anxious to give me their name for every one that might wish to withdraw. As there was no Champions returned last year, I could publish no such falsehood. You are the man for that, as you don't seem to know the difference between truth and falsehood. You say Mr. Bell endorsed all that you said in your letter. I say, most emphatically, he did not. Was it endorsing you when he told you that he dictated his letter to us and signed his own name? In your first letter you said he did neither. Mr. Bell told me himself what took place on the Square, and one word from him would weigh more than a whole ream of your humbug. Surely for cool impudence commend me to a horn. As to Mr. Miller, I never heard anybody call him dishonest. On the contrary, all speak of him as an honorable man. The verdict is far different concerning you. Your explanation of the receipt given is ingenious, but altogether too thin to wash. The hole might be large enough for you to crawl out of (for there is surprising shrinkage in men of your stamp when in a tight place), where it not for the receipted Bill, which reads as follows:—

Mr. Miller says he would not pay any freight. He paid you seven dollars, the amount of the breakage, and you receipted the bill. Does this settle the breakage question, or will you try some other dodge? As to the company I keep, there is no danger of losing the respect of honest men as long as I keep away from you, which I shall take good care to do. Your miserable insinuation about paying 100 cts. on a dollar, and adding interest to notes after being drawn, is as contemptible as it is false. *Conceived in ignorance*, brought forth in meanness, and published in malice, you dare not make such a charge against me in a direct and manly way, lest I should ignore all "phases of the moon" (that you are so well posted in) and hold you responsible as I would a sane man.

Your enquiry concerning who took money out of Wood and the Buckeye Machine Co. years ago, is a conundrum I can not answer. *I don't believe anybody did.* As I am no funkier of theirs, I have never been stuffed with any such nonsense; but I know this, that I never bought a Machine of either Company; never acted as their Agent; never sought an Agency from either of them; *don't owe either a dollar, nor never did.* Do you want any more on this point? It has been said that if you were awakened suddenly out of a sound sleep and asked who "made you," you would say Walter A. Wood. Be that as it may, you had better be careful how you repeat and publish as facts matters you know nothing about, except from hearsay. Better men than you have got themselves into trouble by doing so.
