The British answer to this question is "yes," and the reason is simply summed up by one thing only: Britain's shortage of dollars.

But keen though we always are to buy the best possible article in terms of good value for our spending dollar, there is also another answer and another reason.

The economies of Britain and of Canada are essentially complementary ones to the other. We are a producer of agricultural products and of raw or semi-processed wood products and minerals.

Prime Minister John Diefenbaker talks of slashing 15 per cent off our huge purchases from the States, and switching those purchases to British exporters.

Shots Urgent If Tonsils Are Out

While I firmly believe children should be given the protection the Salk anti-polio vaccine offers, it is especially important that youngsters who have had their tonsils removed be inoculated with all three doses.

From studies conducted during and after our polio outbreak in Chicago last year, we have concluded that a polio victim is more apt to contract the serious bulbar type if his tonsils have been removed.

Statistically, a person with polio is three and one-half times as likely to develop bulbar involvement if his tonsils are absent.

With regard to tonsillectomies, however, I'd like to emphasize that the importance of having tonsils removed when clinically indicated and the benefits such an operation will bring far outweigh the possible danger of bulbar involvement.

However, doctors believe it is advisable that anyone who has had his tonsils removed or plans to have them removed in the near future should get all three Salk inoculations properly spaced.

This, in my opinion, would minimize the danger to a great degree.
