He will sail out to meet the liner in the Mediterranean a few miles offshore in his yellow and white yacht Deo Juvante, which borrows its name from his family motto: "With God's Help." ### NEW WAVE OF

Cypriot Combatants is the terrorist branch of the union with Greece movement. British authorities said it is led by a man calling himself "Dighennis" — the name of a legendary Greek and Cypriot warrior during the days of Otoman rule here. It is a real name, the British believe, is a Col. Grivas, who led an extreme right-wing organization in Greece immediately after the war. LEADER UNYIELDING The document quoting a letter about "Dighennis" said: "The Leader is unyielding and no retreat is possible, not even to the smallest degree from the proposals of the archbishop. That is why the Leader is in Nicosia so as not to allow the archbishop any retraction whatever." British authorities have insisted that the exiled prime minister control the rebels. The documents, which included orders in the campaign to force the leader to halt during the negotiations. But violence continued. The full was to be used for reorganization for "active operations against the British." Meanwhile, members of hotel staffs in Nicosia returned to work Sunday, indicating that Saturday's general strike by Greek clerks, laborers and shopkeepers was over. International broadcasts from Athens radio were coming into Cyprus clearly Sunday, but broadcasts directed to Cyprus continued to be jammed. GROUND CANBERRAS LONDON (Reuters) — The RAF has grounded temporarily a number of Canberra medium jet bombers because of a small mechanical fault, the air ministry announced Monday.
