OTTAWA, (CP)—Britain's first sea lord, Admiral Sir Rhoderick McGrigor, arrived here Monday for a series of top-level naval talks with military and government officials.

Commonwealth naval problems will be the main subject discussed by the Royal Navy's chief of naval staff during his three-day visit here.

Poles In Exile Elect Government

LONDON (Reuters)—Lines of wistful refugees from Communist Poland marked ballots in pooling booths throughout Britain Monday to elect a government in exile.

It was the first such election since hundreds of thousands of

anti-Communist Poles settled in Britain at the end of the Second World War rather than return to their Communist-dominated homeland.

There are about 100,000 refugees in Britain. Some 35,000 of them live in London.

Voting booths were set up throughout Britain for Monday's election. They will remain open until Wednesday for absentee ballots.

Expect Important Changes In Roman Catholic Church Central Government

VATICAN CITY (Reuters)—Important changes are expected in the central government of the Roman Catholic Church following the appointment of the Pope's right-hand man, Msgr. Giovanni Battista Montini, as Archbishop of Milan.

The appointment, made known Wednesday, created more excitement in the 100-acre Vatican City state than any since the war.

For 10 years Msgr. Montini, an expert in canon law, has in practice been the most obvious channel of communications between the austere solitude of the Pope and the day-to-day world.

As pro-secretary of state for ordinary affairs, most of the routine work passed through his hands to the Pope. His knowledge of worldwide affairs of the church is second only to that of the Pope.

OUTSIDE EXPERIENCE

Many Vatican observers believe there can be only one explanation for his promotion to the Archbishopric of Milan.

They think the explanation is the Pope's desire to give his 57-year-old aide experience in the field, after 32 years work in the Vatican's "bureaucracy."

The archbishop of Milan is in practice always made a cardinal. Archbishop Montini, as a cardinal, would be among the three or four most likely to be the next Pope.

His work in the Vatican will for the present be taken over by Msgr. Domenico Tardini, hitherto the secretary of state for extraordinary affairs.

It is generally believed that the Pope will eventually name a full secretary of state, a post that he

has virtually held himself, since the death of the last secretary of state, Luigi Cardinal Maglione, in 1944.

OTHER CHANGES

It is also generally believed that the Pope intends during the coming winter to make several other important changes in the personnel of the Vatican hierarchy.

One effect of these is expected to be another step forward in his policy of internationalization — of putting prelates of different nationalities into jobs held for centuries only by Italians.

One result already has been that for the first time in the history of the Catholic Church there are twice as many non-Italian cardinals as Italians, 44 against 22.

The proportion may grow if the Pope shortly holds a new consistory, main object of which would be to grant the cardinal's red hat to Archbishop Montini.

There are at present four vacancies in the college of cardinals, whose limit has been held for 300 years at 70. All of these, and any that may occur in the meantime, would likely be filled at a new consistory.

Reports Plan For Bogus Vote Failed

MONTREAL, (CP)—The Montreal Herald said Tuesday it had turned over to it more than 250 voters' slips that professional vote telegraphers had planned to use in Monday's federal by-elections in Montreal St. Antoine-Westmount and Montreal St. Lawrence-St. George.

"About 30 men, who admit being professional telegraphers and election-day strong-arm boys, turned over more than 250 voters' slips to The Herald Monday," the newspaper says.

"They claimed they had refused to vote illegally when their pay-off was held back."

The slips were turned over to the RCMP for investigation.

The term "telegrapher" is used in connection with elections to describe a person who votes or attempts to vote illegally in the name of another person.
