

The Couriers re-organized the Straits yesterday morning with return mail. seems a special mail bag has been made up for Summerside, as during summer. Only that the citizens of this place, however, telegraphed to the Cape to have it brought here, at their own expense, it would have gone the rounds via Crapaud, Charlottetown, Kensington, St. Eleanor's, &c., &c. Now is not this provoking? What, we ask, will be done with the £13,000 collected in this port this summer as duties? It strikes us very forcibly that our most pressing wants should be first supplied. A petition should be sent to the Postmaster General, at once, for a redress of this grievance, if it cannot be effected in no other way, we would like his attention to be given to this matter.

We understand that the ladies of St. Eleanor's are, finally, are about getting up a public entertainment, to be held in the St. Eleanor's Court House, to come off as soon as possible after Christmas. The object of this entertainment is to raise funds for the purpose of paying off a debt contracted for improving the interior of the Parish Church. We sincerely hope that the ladies will succeed in their undertaking, for we are convinced that no money was ever better laid out than that which was expended in improving and beautifying the fabric of the English Church of St. Eleanor's. To-day however, it is again nearly closed up. People have been crossing the ice on foot up the river since Friday last.

The Steamer "Princess of Wales" made her last trip for this season from Shediac to Summerside and Charlottetown on the 12th inst. Last fall her corresponding final trip was made on Dec. 7th. We learn that she made a trip to Pictou on Tuesday last.

We have now had clear and frosty weather for about ten days, with the exception of last Monday, when we were visited by a violent snow storm which has no doubt laid the foundation of our winter sleighing.

We are glad to see some of our friends agitating the speedy opening of the winter course of the "Summerside Literary Institute and Debating Society." The first regular meeting will probably take place on the second Tuesday in January. In the meantime a meeting will be held to appoint officers for the ensuing year.

We have not heard anything about the Drill shed lately. Come and get up a petition praying to have the use of it for a market house this winter, which will not interfere with its usefulness as a "Drill shed."
