NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The Boston Standard says that some clubs are booming. How about the Charlottetown Club?

The monster ship Olive Bank left Vancouver a few days ago with 2,215,084 feet of lumber for South Africa. The net tonnage of the vessel is 2,427 tons.

M. Jules Verne, though in his 79th year, works for five or six hours a day. He is now engaged upon a story for 1897, but he has five manuscripts ready for the printers.

In cutting down expenditures, rather than in taking sugar and other articles from the free list and subjecting them to duty, the Government have adopted a policy that will be approved by the people at large.

Heroism among British soldiers is by no means a tradition. During the fighting at Chitral, in India, Capt. Willichour carried the wounded Capt. Bond on his back, and led his troops at the same time. And he won the battle.

The Boston Standard favors the "annexation" of Newfoundland, and says: "The initial step can be taken that shall ultimately lead to the Maritime Provinces, and the Dominion as a whole, becoming an integral part of the United States." But the initial step won't be taken.

Montreal Gazette: The Opposition did not make so much out of its criticism of the Government's immigration policy yesterday as it might. After cutting ten thousand from the Manitoba Government's claim, the province's population is shown to have increased since 1891 from 162,000 to 195,000, or by 20 per cent. That is doubling in twenty years, and the rural communities are rare when that rate is recorded.

Reports from the United States announce "liberal increases in the pay of mill workmen. Relative to the wage question, Mr. Carroll D. Wright, United States labor commissioner, said recently, in an address at the Cooper Union, New York: "In the past, the mill owner and manufacturer cut wages when times were hard, but when times were good they did not seem to be so ready to raise them. From all quarters of the country we are receiving reports of voluntary increases in wages. I am glad to see it. If employers would only convince employees that there is a bond of sympathy between them, much trouble would be averted. Generalizing the outlook for next year, I would predict that it is to be one of continually increasing prosperity, and a period of understanding between the employer and the employee."

Paisley, conducting the preliminary service. Appropriate remarks were made at the close of the service by Rev. Messrs. Lucas and Withman. The burial in the cemetery was read by Rev. S. T. Teed, Rev. C. H. Paisley and William Penna taking part. The pall bearers were Revs. Job Sheaton, Thomas Marshall, John C. Berrie, Samuel Howard, E. A. Withman, and H. S. Crisp. The order of Foresters attended in full regalia and presented an imposing appearance. The departed minister was much beloved by the people to whom he ministered, and his death was a sad and warm expression of regret and sympathy fully attested.

PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Summary of Senator Ferguson's Speech in the Senate.

In the Senate, the debate on the address was closed by Hon. D. Ferguson. According to the Montreal Gazette's report, he began by referring to the charge of the Opposition that the bill of fare furnished for the speech from the throne was a meagre one, and remarked that if he were it had evolved a long and interesting debate. He playfully alluded to the destructive tendency evinced in the speech of the leader of the Opposition towards principles which had become time-honored by-words in the policy of the Liberal party. He had been wholly unprepared to hear the leader of the Opposition denounce the Government for not disallowing the Manitoba acts of 1890, in view of the fact that in the past the Liberal party had always professed provincial rights as the foremost plank in its platform.

Senator Scott—"The disallowance of those acts would have been no interference with provincial rights." That is the hon. gentleman's opinion, but his leader in the lower House is of quite another opinion. He was likewise astonished at the hon. gentleman's open condemnation of the course pursued by his Liberal friends in Manitoba on the school question by his agreeing with all that had been said in denigrating their action by the Premier in his speech the other day. The assertion made by Senator Power that the Conservative party in Manitoba had co-operated with the Liberals in agreeing to the local acts of 1890 he disapproved of quoting from speeches made by the late Archbishop Tache commending the same taken by the Conservative party in that province on the school question. He had also been much surprised to hear the leader of the Opposition vigorously denouncing the Toronto Globe, the organ of the Liberal party.

Senator Scott—"The Globe is not the organ of the Liberal party." Senator Ferguson—"If I keep on I will have the hon. gentleman denouncing everything and everybody connected with the Liberal party." (Hear, hear and laughter.)

Senator Scott—"I speak for myself. It is not the organ of the Liberal party so far as I am concerned." The hon. gentleman then referred to Senator Scott's denunciation of Sir Oliver Mowat's policy in reference to the Ontario iron bonuses as a piece of folly and his denunciation of the action of the Hon. Edward Ross in his speech in the House of Commons of the resolution directing that the Government should obtain for its guidance judicial opinion upon all questions affecting the constitution.

A FAIRLY GOOD RECORD OF DENUNCIATION. This, he thought, was a fairly good record of denunciation of party and political principles for a speech lasting a little over an hour. Coming to the Manitoba School Question, he thought the question should be regarded as settled. PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Heavy Cuts in Salaries of Both Inside and Outside Services.

Economy the Order of the Day—Not a Higher Tariff.

OTTAWA, April 30. The estimates for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1896, show the following among the decreases in the departments here: Civil Service: \$2,500 in the Interior Department; \$2,000 in the Militia Department; \$500 in the Indian Department; \$500 in the Auditor General's Office; \$700 in the Finance Department; \$1,500 in the Customs Department; \$750 in the Inland Revenue Department; \$200 in the Post Office Department; \$2,000 in the Agriculture Office; \$500 in the Department of Marine, and \$500 in the Printing Bureau. The total saving under the head of civil government is \$30,154. The penitentiaries grants show a decrease of \$36,268; legislation shows a reduction of \$22,056; arts and agriculture \$3,400; quarantine, \$33,743; immigration, \$12,433; Pensions, \$143; Militia, \$263,308. The subsidy to the steamers from Halifax and St. John to the West Indies and South America is reduced from \$103,000 to \$80,000. The Inland Revenue Department of P. E. Island is cut down \$2,000. The total decrease under the ocean and river service is \$57,160. The light-house and coast service is cut down by almost \$68,000. There is a saving of \$20,775 in the amount to be voted for the fisheries, the reduction in New Brunswick and P. E. Island being \$1,000 for each province. The total saving in the post office salary list is \$1,955. A little over \$23,000 is lopped off the grant for Dominion lands chargeable to income, and \$25,000 from the Dominion lands chargeable to capital.

Mr. McMullen gives notice of a bill to reduce the salaries of Lieutenant Governors—those of Ontario and Quebec to \$5,000 each; those of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Manitoba and British Columbia to \$5,000 each; and that of P. E. Island to \$4,000. Sir Mackenzie Bowell has introduced an insolvency bill.
