Mr. Harold Leard, Lower Bedeque, spent the week-end at the Manse, the guest of Rev. and Mrs. Crowe.

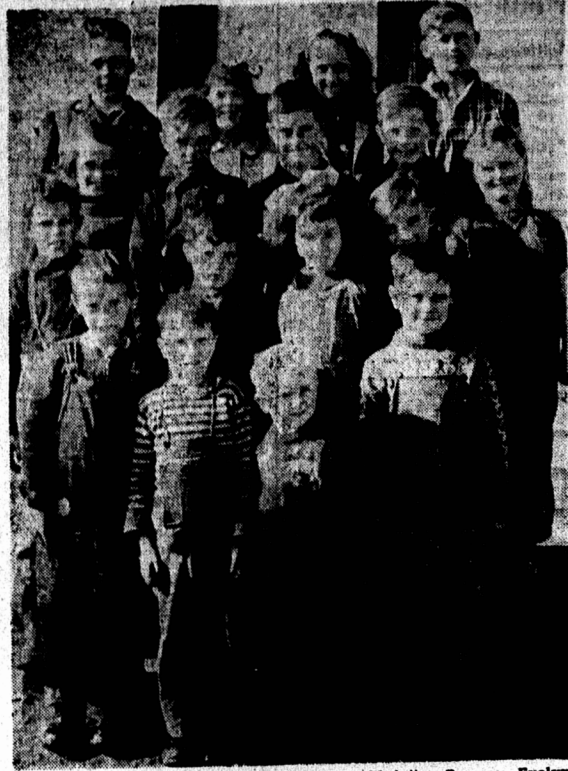
Rev. and Mrs. Howard Christie and little son, Hunter River, were guests at the Manse, Bedeque, on Monday 27, en route to Halifax, by car.

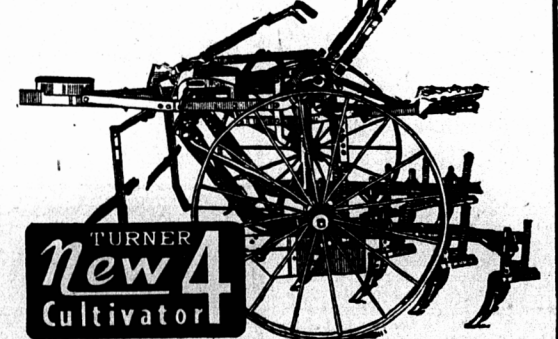
