P.E.I. Leads In Trans-Canada Highway Building

P. E. Island has the largest percentage of Trans-Canada Highway completed of any province in the Dominion according to a statement recently made by Hon. Robert Winters, Federal Minister of Public Works at a Maritime Provinces Association banquet in Edmonton, Alberta.

Questioned on the overall situation in this province with respect to the highway at this time, officials of the Provincial Department of Public Works and Highways said yesterday that 322 miles of the Trans-Canada Highway had been graded, 30.5 miles paved, 11.7 miles under construction and approximately 32 miles to do which may vary a mile or two when the final route is determined in certain areas.

The new housing legislation provides for entry of chartered banks into the field of home-mortgage lending under a plan of government-administered mortgage insurance paid for by the home buyer.

Ask Out Payment. The CCA said that if the government finds that banks do not fill the gap between the demand and supply of mortgage money, the crown-owned Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation should resume its present role of sharing mortgage investments with the lending institutions.

Its brief also urged smaller down payments than provided in the bill and said a 30-year mortgage term should be allowed "when necessary and justified."

It said the past requirement that mortgages carrying charges must not exceed 23 per cent of the owner's income has prevented a number of potential buyers from owning homes. It suggested that 20 per cent of the income of a working wife should also be considered in calculating a family's ability to carry a mortgage.

Canadian Shoe Shipments Up

OTTAWA, (CP)—Canadian shoe factories shipped 37,430,938 pairs of leather footwear in 1952, more than in any other year except 1945 and 1946, the Bureau of Statistics reported Tuesday.

The 1952 total was 4,323,778 pairs or 13 per cent more than in 1951. Factory value in 1952 was \$128,265,771, a seven-per-cent increase over 1951 production. The industry employed 20,697 persons.

Imports were up \$6,120,327. Exports increased to \$2,040,253 on \$1,637,942 in 1951.

Quebec factories supplied 60 per cent of all shoes manufactured in Canada compared with 59 per cent in 1951. Ontario firms turned out 37.5 per cent against 39 per cent in the preceding year. The remainder came from British Columbia, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Alberta.

Discussing the ultimate benefits to be derived from more East-West trade, Churchill said:

Canadians Eat Less Butter

OTTAWA, (CP)—Canadians are eating a little less butter per capita than in 1950.

A return tabled in the Commons Wednesday by the Trade Department showed the estimated 1953 consumption of 19.2 pounds per person, compared with 19.9 in 1950.

The return showed 1953 Canadian production at 302,606,000 pounds, compared with 261,464,000 in 1950. Production was up in all provinces except Saskatchewan and Alberta where the figures dropped, respectively, to 27,600,000 from 29,972,000 and to 29,935,000 from 31,238,000.
