A SAD RECORD. It is said that no less than fifteen human beings have been buried in the district of Beaupre Qu., within the last 15 months.

FALL OF A METEOR.—A whizzing meteor flashed through the air at Skilmore, Ky., and was seen by scores of persons. It buried itself in a sand pit, 50 feet below the earth's surface. The next day it was unearthed and proved to be a lump of iron, nickel and cobalt, 18 inches long, 10 inches wide and weighing 12 pounds.

A PECULIAR EXPLOSION.—An Omaha despatch says: Z. T. Clark, an Omaha lawyer, was practically blown up Wednesday by the explosion of the contents of a safety match safe which he carried in his vest pocket. He was just turning from the crowded street into his office, when a loud explosion was heard and a sheet of flames darted from the vest pocket of the lawyer and extended several feet into the air. Clark was knocked down or fell from fright, and the people surrounding him hastily scattered to a safe distance. A policeman rushed forward and raised the wounded man from the pavement. He was badly burned about the hands and face, but was not internally injured. The accident was attributed to friction igniting the chlorate of potash used in the match case.
