

Air Service Proposes Early Morning Flight

ALBERTON — Harold Kemp, manager of Island Flying Services Ltd., Charlottetown last night addressed a meeting of the Board of Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade regarding the possibility of his company instituting an early morning passenger flight from Charlottetown and Summerside to Moncton.

An early morning flight has recently been discontinued by Maritime Central Airways and Mr. Kemp stated his purpose in coming to Alberton was to ascertain what support could be expected from the people of Western Prince for such a service.

A greater interest by Islanders in flying was urged by the speaker who suggested the reopening of Mount Pleasant airport for mercy flights, charter flights, flying tourists and possibly for air mail and air freight.

Dr. C.M. Dewar, O'Leary, a director in the new company, advised the meeting that the runways at the former airport station were in excellent condition and he considered the airport could become a valuable asset to West Prince.

The passenger service project received the support of the meeting and the reopening of the airport proposal was left for a regular meeting of the board.

Frank Brian, president of the board, chaired the meeting held in Alberton library.

Canadian-Built Sub Hunter Is Tested By Royal Navy

LONDON (CP) — The Royal Navy is evaluating a Canadian-built submarine hunter and a spokesman said Monday it will be installed in one of the new Leader class frigates.

The Variable Depth Sonar system, manufactured by Electrical and Musical Industries (Canada) Limited in Halifax, has been used on Royal Canadian Navy ships for about three years.

British admiralty official said the device still is considered secret. He declined to give details of its use by the navy.

It is understood the gear, consisting of a transducer in a streamlining body is lowered through the ocean's thermal layers overcoming a sub's ability to escape detection by hiding in or under the layers.

A cable with a core of electrical conductors transmits impulses back to the ship and also supplies power to the transducer. The device is lowered until it finds when the layer is too thin.

British submarines could use the layers to retreat or completely resist impulses from hull-mounted sonar sets.

Thermal layers are particularly troublesome off the Canadian coast and the device's development is a product of German work during the Second World War.

It was first used in HMCS New Liskeard. The streamlined version, made by EMI in Halifax, was used in HMCS Crusader.

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Grain Harvesting Continuing Here

Three combines were harvesting grain yesterday in a field near Charlottetown. It was learned from Leo McIsaac, Mermaid farmer, who also operates a farm machinery business in Charlottetown. Each machine will cut from 12 to 15 acres per day, he said.

There is still close to 100 acres to be cut from a total crop of 400 to 450 acres, and the grain is still threshing out pretty good.

"We are getting about 45 bushels of barley per acre," he said, "in comparison to the 65 bushels per acre" that was taken early in the season, before storm damage took its toll.

"We have a some grain we rethreshed about six weeks ago, before potato harvesting started, and it's still sitting up on the stable and in good shape. We expect to get it tomorrow," he said.

Former Premier Of France Dies

PARIS (CP) — Albert Sarraut, twice premier of France in the 1930s, died here Monday at the age of 80.

A prominent radical, he spent more than 30 years in the front of French politics.

Born in Bordeaux, Sarraut worked as a newspaper reporter before entering the National Assembly for the first time in 1902.

He held many governmental posts and was a cabinet minister almost continuously during the 1920s and 1930s.

In 1944 he was arrested in France by the Germans and sent to Germany, where he was freed by French forces in May, 1945.

He was governor-general of Indochina from 1911 to 1914 and again from 1916 to 1919. He was ambassador to Turkey in 1923-1928.

After the Second World War, Sarraut became president of the Assembly of the French Union, the consultative third house of the French parliament advising on French overseas territories and the Indochinese states.

He advocated negotiation and not force to settle post-war independence in Indochina.
