NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market made its strongest rally in four months Wednesday and wiped out some of the losses it has taken in the recent series of sharp setbacks.

The advance added an estimated \$3,500,000,000 to the quoted value of stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange, based on the rise in The Associated Press average. This 60-stock average rose \$2.70 to \$223.60.

Aluminums continued their strength shown even in Tuesday's lower market. Electronics, beaten down recently from their huge gains, took the warpath again with bigger gains than other groups.

Aluminum Ltd., was the most active stock, up 2 at 33 1/2.

Also active and higher in the Canadian section, up 2 1/2 to 95. Hudson Bay Mining rose 1 1/2, Walker-Gooderham 1 1/2, McIntyre Porcupine 1 1/2, and Dome Mines 1 1/2.

Higher among the Canadians on the American stock exchange were Scurry Rainbow Oil, Fargo Oil, Preston East Dome and Canadian Marconi.
