## NEWS NOTES FROM OTTAWA

### Colonel Domville Wants an Investigation.

THE ALASKA BOUNDARY MATTER BROUGHT UP

Sir Wilfrid Says His Government is Fully Informed.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, June 3.—Colonel Domville appeared before the Public Accounts Committee and demanded that the investigation be resumed into the affair of the \$300 cheque received by him in 1897 ostensibly as payment of armoury rent to J. Milton Barnes.

When the Drummond railway contract was called up for second reading Kaulback and Pope spoke.

Before the next order of business was called Sir Charles Tupper read a cable message about the condition of the Alaska boundary negotiations.

Premier Laurier stated in reply to the Opposition leader that Lord Salisbury had kept the Canadian Government fully informed as to the discussion with Choate.

The Premier regretted that the rules of diplomacy prevented him from stating the exact condition of affairs. But as such statement would remove the cloud of misapprehension he hoped that before the session closed he would be in a position to bring down the protocol in the Alaska boundary negotiations.

### WOMAN CRUCIFIES HERSELF.

In Atonement For Her Sins, She May Recover.

BURLINGTON, Vt., June 3.—Impelled by the insane idea that on a certain date she must crucify herself in some manner similar to the crucifixion of Jesus Christ upon the cross, Della Deutally, 42 years of age, a domestic in the family of C. A. Barber, at the Proctor Palace on the Eschburn road drove a spike through both feet and one hand, using a hammer, yesterday, and lay down to die.

She was taken to the hospital, where she was calm and apparently in no great pain.

She will recover, if blood poisoning does not result.

To those who saw her after the crucifixion, the woman said she had known that she must do the thing for several days, and that the day was set some time ago. It was, she said, her atonement for sin, and she had to do it.

### BALLOON WITH ENGINES.

The Invention of Professor Charles Hite, of Burlington.

BURLINGTON, N. J., June 3.—An air ship—a navigable balloon, as it is also called—invented by Professor Charles Hite, a scientist, who was with the Peary expedition, is being built at the home of Professor William D. T. Travis, here, under the supervision of Charles Kink, an aeronaut, of Philadelphia. A company, of which Mr. Hite is the head, has been organized for its manufacture. The machine will be cigar shaped, with car attachment and will be driven by two very small but powerful engines. Carbon dioxide will be the motive power. The ordinary balloon, it is figured, is servile to the density and rarity of the atmosphere. It is hoped to overcome this in the Hite invention, the powerful fans of which, it is believed, will drive the balloon in any direction in any current of air and make the length of the trip optional with the voyager. A test of the engine and balloon will be made at Trenton soon. A small model of the invention it is said, was recently given a successful test in Philadelphia.

LONDON, June 3.—The following Queen's Birthday honors are announced: Alma Tadema, the artist, and J. A. Boyd, Chancellor of the High Court of Ontario, were knighted.

Henry M. Stanley, M. P., is made a Knight of the Grand Cross of the Bath. Charles Howard Vincent, M. P., and James Rennell Rodd, Secretary of the British Consulate General in Egypt, are made Knight Commanders of St. Michael and St. George.

Percy Sanderson, British Consul General at New York, is made a Knight Commander of St. Michael and St. George, and Captain John D. Barr of the British second class cruiser Interpid, for his recent services at Blu. fields, is made Companion of St. Michael and St. George.

Sir Charles Howard Vincent was honored for his services during the recent anarchist conference at Rome.

## CANADA STILL BEING ABUSED

### Concerning the Alaskan Boundary

WAS CANADA CONSULTED IN THE NEGOTIATIONS?

This is What the British Public Would Like to Know.

MONTREAL, June 3.—The Star's London cable says: Times and other New York and Washington telegrams continue to abuse Canada for daring to reject the agreement between Lord Salisbury and Mr. Choate, regarding the Alaskan boundary after the rising of the Joint High-Commission in February.

What the British public would like to know is whether Canada was fully consulted in the negotiation of this agreement. If not Canada will receive much sympathy here, as the outlook says today that the British public feel that the day has gone by when any self-governing British Colony can be dragged into a settlement in which it has no say.

Canada is no-seer, is not even a child. She is a junior partner and has junior partner's rights, the last word being always with the senior partner.

Mr. Smalley and his Washington friends would ignore this if they could. But it remains a central fact in the administration of the British Empire.

### IRISH EMIGRATION.

Almost 34,000 People Left the Depopulated Parts During '98.

DUBLIN, June 3.—The emigration statistics for the year 1898 show that the number of emigrants was 33,265, or 7.4 per 100 of the population, being an increase of 953 as compared with the number in 1897. Of this total 23,234 were natives of Ireland and 10,031 were persons belonging to other countries. The number of alien-emigrants show an extraordinary increase of 1,253 over the number for 1897, and the number of native-emigrants a decrease of 2,964. The total of native emigrants for 1898 is the lowest since 1851, the year when the emigration returns first began to be collected. Of the 15,265 males who emigrated in 1898, 71 per cent were returned as "labourers," while nearly 75 per cent of the 18,000 female emigrants were returned as "servants."

### NEW HAMPSHIRE TRAGEDY

Unhappy Family Relations Result in the Murder of a Wife.

KEENE, N. H., June 1.—Mrs. Louis Caster was shot and killed yesterday morning at the house of Mrs. William Van Ness. The woman's husband is charged with the murder, and officers are searching the woods in the vicinity, where it is believed he is hid. The tragedy was the result of a difficulty of long standing. The married life of Mr. and Mrs. Caster has been far from a happy one and after quarreling a number of times the woman has been in the habit of leaving home and going to the houses of friends, where she would remain for a period, and finally return to her husband. Three weeks ago the woman took her children and went to live in the house of Mr. William Van Ness. Yesterday morning Caster called and pleaded with his wife to return with him. On her refusal he shot her three times, the last shot striking her in the breast and killing her. Caster is forty-eight years old, and they have had several children, the oldest being 19 years.
