SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The fact that a party of American railway magnates visited our Province on Sunday last under unusual circumstances has caused widespread and unfavorable comment. A special trip of the Princess was made to bring them to Charlottetown; they were met by the Premier and driven about the town; a special train was sent out on the Railway to convey them to Summerside and the Northumberland made a special trip to Point Du Chene to convey them again across the Straits. On the other side another special train was waiting to carry them over the Intercolonial.

No person will claim that this transportation by two boats and three railway trains was a work of either necessity or of mercy. Judged by any standard of Scripture or of the law of the land it was plain, open, lawless Sabbath breaking, countenanced and abetted by those in high authority in both the Federal and Provincial Governments. It was a bold and wicked defiance of the law and of the moral sentiment of the community. Even the hour of worship was disturbed by the whistle of the train.

Has it come to this that into our Sabbath-keeping country a party of foreigners can come when they will and turn our day of rest and worship thus wholly to secular uses, defy our laws, outrage the religious sentiment of our people and find themselves aided and abetted by the highest in our land? All this was done on Sunday last and for hire! Apart from its moral aspects the transaction is one which has cheapened the Governments of the country in the eyes of our own people as well as in that of our less scrupulous neighbors. One can fancy them over the border saying derisively, that Canadian Sabbath observance is only a matter of price.

We believe that no greater calamity can befall a land than for its rulers, the rich and the great, to set the laws of God and man at defiance with impunity and without rebuke. We therefore register our protest against the transaction of Sunday last, and we trust that our law-abiding people will join us in setting upon it the seal of their strong and earnest disapprobation. Bear in mind that this wholesale, flagrant and wicked desecration of the Sabbath was perpetrated on one day by authority of our Governments in four Provinces of the Dominion! And this to gratify the pleasure of a band of millionaire foreigners who have scant respect for our flag, or our Government. Canada has been humiliated in this by those to whom she has entrusted the keeping of her honor.

INDEPENDENT NOT NEUTRAL.

It suits the offices holders and others to whom the columns of the Patriot newspaper are open, to assail the "independence" of THE GUARDIAN because we have spoken favorably of one candidate for the Commons and less favorably of another. Be it observed that both these candidates are of the same party; we therefore do not trench upon party politics in expressing a preference. There is no question of tariffs, or of any matters that divided our two great parties, that is in any way at issue between the two candidates who are in the field. Any elector, be he Liberal or Conservative violates no party principle, makes default in his party allegiance by choosing or rejecting the one or the other.

Such being the facts it becomes the duty of an independent newspaper having to advise the people, to speak freely its opinions as to how best the interests of the constituency, of the Province and the Dominion can be served. This we have done and shall continue to do as opportunity demands. THE GUARDIAN is entirely independent of parties, of Governments and of Oppositions. We neither fear the frown nor court the favor of either. But we neither undertake, nor do our intelligent readers expect us, to be silent when matters affecting the interest of the public are concerned. A public journal that has no opinions will soon be relegated to the oblivion it deserves. We are independent but not neutral.

The Patriot on the contrary professes to be an organ of liberal principles. Owned as it is by a joint stock company, it is found in the peculiar position of having the larger half of its stock owned by gentlemen favorable to one candidate while the majority of its directors, with the Premier at their head, favor the other. It suits the President and the directors who are of his way of thinking that the paper shall advocate Mr. Farquharson's candidature, assail Mr. Hazzard and refuse admission to articles or letters in favor of the latter. Scores of Liberals, representing as we believe a majority of their party in the riding find themselves

control, must react against the paper and against the candidate whose cause it espouses. It must have its influence upon the minds of every lover of fair play and even-handed justice.

Public sentiment cannot be controlled or guided by the sinister methods which the Patriot has adopted. It demands a full and free expression of opinion upon all subjects of popular interest. Where the right to such free expression is denied, public sentiment, like an obstructed stream, will rise till it overflows or sweeps away the obstruction. We therefore warn the Patriot that it must pursue a more just and generous course if it is to retain its old-time influence in its party or hold the respect of the general public. We speak plainly and earnestly, and also in a more generous spirit than that which dictated the attack upon THE GUARDIAN'S independence.

We regret to note that Hon. N. Clarke Wallace's illness is so severe as to leave small hope of his recovery. Mr. Wallace is of Irish percentage, but was born in Ontario. He is now in his 57th year. He first came before the public as an active Orangeman and a member of the Municipal Council. He has been Grand Master of the Loyal Orange Association of British America since 1887 and was for six years President of the Triennial Council of Orangemen of the world. He was elected to Parliament for West York in 1878 and has held the seat continuously since, being sometimes returned by the largest majorities ever accorded any candidate in Canada. He held the portfolio of Minister of Customs under Sir John Thompson and Sir Mackenzie Bowell. He was one of the Conservative members who strongly opposed the Remedial Bill in 1900-1.

The Patriot charges that in quoting form one of its articles about the credit due for obtaining the \$30,000 subsidy we omitted the words "on account of one claim we had against the Federal Government." The words have a special bearing upon the point we were endeavoring to make. Our point was that now the Patriot is giving all the credit to Mr. Farquharson for a service for which it had previously landed Sir Louis Davies. If the result was entirely due to the Premier, no credit should have been given to Sir Louis Davies.
