Magic Writing

Present a person with a slip of paper a pen and a tumbler of water and desire him to dip the pen into the water and write down whatever he pleases.

When dry, the words will be invisible, but if the paper is immersed in the contents of the tumbler, the writing will make its appearance quite distinctly.

To perform this the pen should be a quill one and new, and the water in the tumbler should have one or two crystals of sulphate of iron (green vitriol) previously dissolved in it, while, the writer should be careful the pen does not get dry in use.

When the writing has been executed, the tumbler should be taken away, on pretense of the water being rather dirty and wanting changing. Another similar tumbler is brought back filled to the same height with water, in which a few drops of tincture of galls have been poured. When the paper is immersed in this, the writing will quickly appear.

I do hereby give Public Notice that an Election for a Commissioner of Sewers and Water Supply for the City of Charlottetown, in the place of Hon David Laird, resigned, will be held on

Thursday, the 18th day of May, A. D 1899,

at the several places, that is to say:

In Ward No. 1, at or near the office of Mr John Maceachern, Queen Street.

In Ward No. 2, at or near the house of Thomas Connolly, opposite Mr. E. Heartz's Warehouse, Sidney St, between Great George and Prince Streets.

In Ward No. 3, at or near the Market House.

In Ward No. 4, at or near the City Hall corner of Kent and Queen Streets.

In Ward No. 5, at or near the carriage shop of Phillip Large & Son, Great George Street.

And at the said Election the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

DESCRIPTION OF WARDS.
