H. M. S. Bellerophon, flagship, accompanied by the Sirius, left Halifax for Newport, R. I., to-day.

The City Council meets this evening at 7.30. The appointment of Civic officials is the order of the day.

The P. E. Island Farmer says: "There is no doubt but that the making of potato starch could be made a profitable business on our Island."

The steamer St. Lawrence did not arrive at Summerside from Point Du Chene until 9 o'clock this morning. The mails arrived in this city at 4.30 this afternoon.

A GENTLEMAN remarked this morning that, as the Premier stood waiting "his turn" to speak at the Drill Shed, he should have been photographed and engraved for a frontispiece to the Book of Lamentations.

The schooner Louisa, owned by D. Farquharson, of this city, went ashore at Merigomish, N. S., on Monday evening, where she still remains. As she is in a very good position, it is thought she will come off unhurt. The report that one of the crew was drowned is incorrect.

MATTIE G. SMITH, will deliver her Great Lecture, entitled: "Wonders of the North-West," or "Wonderland." Describing her Great Tour of the North-West of America; the Great American Desert; Rocky Mountains and California, in Y. M. C. A. Hall this evening, at 8 o'clock.

TAKEN altogether, we are bound to confess that no Government ever had to face the electorate of any country with so utterly bad a record as the McKenz'e Administration has to defend. To justify their bad acts they must prove that black is white, they must roll back the tide of time, they must re-write Canadian history for the past five years.—Paris Star.

The Coroner and jury on the Kelly inquest met at 11 o'clock to-day, and were obliged to adjourn until to-morrow, on account of the non-arrival of the steamer M. A. Starr, the captain of which is an important witness. The case will probably be left to the jury after the captain's evidence is taken.

The steamer Worcester, Hedge, master, sailed for Boston at five o'clock this evening, with a cargo of 1,760 barrels of mackerel, 333 cases of eggs and 100 empty oil casks. Mr. John McLean, Mrs. Edward Fisser, Miss Christy Shaw, Miss Jessie McLaren and Mr. Crawford were passengers.

"Two Hearts that Beat as One," viz., a young man and an equally young woman sat on the eastern step of the Colonial Building, opposite Union Bank, for quite a length of time this afternoon, or until their carriages were disturbed by two of our energetic police. They sat so lovingly—she with her arm around his neck—reminding us vividly of the pretty little verse commencing: "Oh! what must it be to be there?"

GRIT SLANDER—"whose tongue out-venoms all the worms of Nile"—is being heaped upon the head of Hon. F. Brecken because he headed not the frons of the Local Premier, and manfully represented fair-play at the Drill Shed. It is apparently well nigh forgotten that Mr. Brecken and his friends provided the public crib at which the leading slanderers feed.

SIR ALBERT SMITH, in the course of his speech upon the issues of the day at Petticoat, said he "thought that a reasonable part of the taxation ought to fall upon shipping." This explains one difficulty about the Government programme, viz., where they are going to get money (if they succeed at the elections) to make up the deficits. They propose to tax the shipping interest.—Hc. Reporter.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon Richard White, drunk and disorderly, was fined \$3 and costs or fourteen days; Lemuel White, for the same offence, was fined \$4 or twenty days; John McQuarrie, drunk and incapable, was fined \$2 and costs or eight days; Daniel McNevin, for trespassing on the property of Charles McDonald, Lower Spring Park Road, was fined \$6 or one month and \$4 for damages to McDonald's property. McNevin was also fined \$10 or one month's hard hard labor for assaulting Benj. Heartz.

OUR NEW GOVERNOR GENERAL.—The Marquis of Lorne, appointed Viceroy of the Dominion of Canada, has issued his address bidding farewell to his constituents in Argylshire. His Lordship says he will always look back with feelings of the greatest pleasure and gratitude to the time during which he represented the county in Parliament, and it is only because, through the favor of the Queen, he now has an opportunity of serving a country most dear to all in the United Kingdom, that he resigns that position.

The election has been sprung upon us. The electors have but three weeks to prepare for the coming election. This is but another evidence of Grit foul play. The Canada Gazette Extra, issued on the 17th, contains three proclamations. The first proclamation orders the dissolution of the third Parliament of the Dominion. The second proclamation orders the calling together of the new Parliament on Saturday, September 21st. The third proclamation authorizes the issue of writs for the election of a new Parliament, nominations throughout the Dominion to take place on the 10th, 8 o'clock and polling on the 17th. Manifesto nominations will be held on the 12th, 9 o'clock.

MONTREAL, Aug. 20. Viceregal residence at Mount Royal Park is mooted in commercial circles.

The Governor-General and suite visited St. John's to-day, and will probably reach here to-morrow.

The Liberals are having caucus upon caucuses, but as yet have no candidate for Montreal West.

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.

One hundred and twenty-nine cases of yellow fever were reported in New Orleans yesterday and forty-two deaths. At Memphis nineteen new cases and twelve deaths. The inhabitants continue to leave the city, and it is estimated that not more than 5,000 whites now sleep within its limits at night. There is no change in the situation at other infected points.

George Vining Bowers, the actor, was buried to-day from the Little Church Around the Corner. Prof. W. R. Hutton, of the College of the City of New York, died yesterday, aged 52.

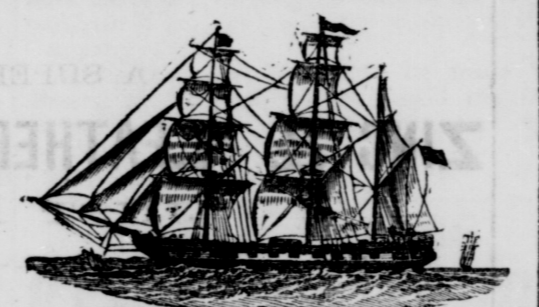
