MONTREAL, Jan. 2. (CP) - Civic officials of Montreal's inundated north-end communities flanking the Riviere des Prairies reported tonight a drop of 20 inches in flood levels during the day and said immediate danger of further flooding is over. However, Mayor Rosario Fortin of Riviere des Prairies, hardest hit of three ice-battered and water-logged towns, warned residents to remain on the alert. It is believed the sudden lowering of levels was caused by the shifting of ice jams following several days of unseasonably mild weather.

(CP) - The National Cancer Institute of Canada today announced that a Toronto doctor and a Kingston, Ont., physicist have been awarded British Empire cancer campaign exchange fellowships. The fellowships, awarded annually by the empire organization in collaboration with the Canadian Institute, went to Dr. M. M. Darte and Arthur F. Holloway. They cover a year of advanced study in cancer research or therapy at a leading British centre.
