

More Than Million Given Up By Widow To Marry Drew

TORONTO (CP) — George McCullagh, son of newly-wed Mrs. George Drew, says his mother gave up between \$1,000,000 and \$2,000,000 of her former husband's estate to marry the one-time Ontario and Canadian political leader.

"It's no sacrifice for her," Mr. McCullagh said Friday in an interview. "Mr. Drew is quite wealthy in his own right."

Mrs. Drew previously was married to the late George McCullagh, former owner of The Telegram and The Globe and Mail. His estate originally was valued at \$1,000,000.

But the estate said the Globe and Mail's Howard Webster, Montreal businessman, for \$10,000.

Nine CBC Officials Resign

TORONTO (CP) — Nine officials connected with the controversial CBC television program This Hour Has Seven Days have resigned, Steve Patrick, a Seven Days researcher and writer, said Friday.

"I've turned in my own resignation. I find it impossible to continue without such men as Beeves Haggan and Douglas Letterman."

Mr. Haggan resigned as general supervisor of public affairs and was succeeded during the day by Peter Campbell, former current affairs supervisor.

Mr. Letterman, the CBC announced earlier, won't have his contract renewed as executive producer of Seven Days.

A controversy over the program has boiled over repeatedly among the corporation's public affairs staff since the CBC fired Patrick Watson and Laurier LaPierre in April as co-hosts of Seven Days.

That the CBC late Friday had only four resignations, Mr. Patrick said: "The others definitely are on the way in."

He said those resigning besides himself were Mr. Watson, who also produced the program Document, Mr. Haggan, documentary film-maker Beryl Fox, Robert Hoyt and Ken Lefoll, alternating producers of Seven Days; story editor — producer Larry Zoff; James Carney, producer of Seven Days' summer replacement show, Compass, and Gabriel Michaelides, a Seven Days researcher.

Canadian Efforts Explained To Bring Peace To Viet Nam

OTTAWA (CP) — Chester Ronning remains the "only contact" between all sides in the Viet Nam conflict, although no spectacular results have come from the Canadian diplomat's two visits to Hanoi.

External Affairs Minister Martin, in giving the Commons this assessment of Canadian efforts to bring about peace in the Far East, said the role of Mr. Ronning was important in a situation where a breakdown in communications could be crucial.

Also significant was that the Canadian diplomat had had "a fair hearing" from Hanoi, Saigon and the U.S.

"The channel remains open and its potential usefulness has not been questioned by anyone," Mr. Martin said.

In a situation as serious as any since the Korean War, Mr. Ronning could become the key to a critical communications line.

"I do not think we can discount the significance of such a channel when the time and circumstances for a solution are ripe."

Mr. Martin said Canada has been told "on the highest authority" that a Geneva conference on the Vietnamese conflict would get nowhere now.

Prime Minister Indira Gandhi of India has asked the co-chairmen of the conference, Britain and the Soviet Union, to convene peace talks.

But Mr. Martin said all information indicates such a meeting at this time would not have the desired result.

Mr. Martin said he has discussed Viet Nam this week with Soviet and U.S. authorities. He would talk to Deputy Premier Dmitri Polyansky of the USSR now touring Canada, again Monday.

The debate on Viet Nam came as the government sought approval of \$1,662,000,000 it is estimated will be spent by Oct. 31, 1966, by government departments.

Opposition Leader Diefenbaker opened the debate by grilling Mr. Martin on Canadian policy.

The external affairs minister said one reason he couldn't answer opposition questions about proposals to end the conflict was that he would have violated a commitment Mr. Ronning made on behalf of Canada.

He didn't say to whom the commitment had been made.

Mr. Martin reiterated that Canada can take strong public positions on Viet Nam, or continue quietly through diplomatic channels to try and find a basis for solving the conflict.

Canada would continue on the latter course.

Mr. Diefenbaker said the proposal of Mr. Thant, United Nations secretary-general, that all parties including the Viet Cong be included in peace talks seemed reasonable and necessary.

He said the government so far has given "a monologue of uncertainty, clothed in magnificent language," when questioned about policy on the conflict.

What was Canada's position on U.S. bombing of North Viet Nam oil depots? How were Communist China and the Soviet Union reacting?

Mr. Martin said Canada has repeatedly expressed reservations about the bombings.

New Democratic Leader Douglas said Mr. Martin has given leadership in seeking a solution to Viet Nam. He merely had listed the difficulties.

The spokesman could give no details except that discussions have been held with the Nova Scotia Power Commission.

Imperial Oil Ltd. and Texaco Canada Ltd. already have plants in Nova Scotia.

CHINA STOPS TOURS

PEKING (Reuters) — China has postponed package tours to the country this summer by several hundred Western tourists, informed sources say. Shortage of suitable accommodation was given as the reason and the sources said the tours might have to be cancelled. An official spokesman declined to comment on the subject.

Opening lead — two of hearts. One of the most interesting persons in bridge history was the late and great Sidney Lenz, who died several years ago. His name became well-known to the public when he participated in a match of 1931, but for many years before this he had been known in bridge circles as the leading authority of the game.

Lenz authored many books, mostly on auction bridge, his style of writing being such that it is combined-interesting material with good prose. Here is an excerpt from one of his books on the contract bridge, but remember that in those days you got ere-

dit for making a game or slam whether you had bid it or not. West had the deal and bid a spade which North doubled and East redoubled. South called two hearts, West two spades, and North went to three hearts East doubled and North then redoubled.

"Aside from North's redouble the bidding appears to be along conventional lines. Even the knave of hearts would go a long way towards making the North-South hands good for nine tricks, conceding a club, a diamond and two hearts to the enemy.

West opened the singleton trump on the reasoning that North's redouble must be based on the ability to trump spades and every trump extracted from his hand would save a trick. South played the nine of hearts thrown in the lead, as he had continued unblocking in the dummy.

When South finessed the ten of clubs, East took the king and West gathered in six tricks in Spades. On the eleventh trick South had the unhappiness of deciding whether it was best to discard the ace of clubs or the queen of diamonds. The perfect squeeze position was inevitable and South made only one trick.
