Legislation extending the present boundaries of the City of Charlottetown to include the whole of the incorporated village of Parkdale together with a portion of the Spring Park area is recommended in the report of Judge C. St. Clair Trainor, Commissioner appointed by the Provincial Government to inquire into the Parkdale water supply problem.

The report, tabled yesterday in the Legislature, states that in the Commissioner's opinion, "the only satisfactory solution of the problem of health and convenience facing the fringe area and the problem of health alone facing the City of Charlottetown occasioned by the lack of a safe water supply in the fringe area is the extension of the present City boundaries followed by the supplying of the fringe area with the normal city services."

### Special Inquiry Recommended

The report concedes that many matters will arise requiring further study and solution, such as the determination of the value of the properties or the manner of determining the quantum of taxation on properties in the undeveloped areas and upon lands presently used for agricultural purposes.
