A DISCREDITED MINISTER.

No greater insult could be offered to Sir Louis Davies than that which Mr. Peters offered him in his arbitration proposal. What have we representatives at Ottawa for? Why has so much been made of the advantage of our having a representative in the Cabinet? Simply because we think that men of our own, who know our wants and circumstances, are better able in Parliament and Council to successfully press our case, than outsiders and strangers. Mr. Peters appears to be of an entirely different opinion. He wants to have our Island claims taken out of the hands of Sir Louis Davies and his Parliamentary supporters, and handed over to men who perhaps never set foot on the Island, and probably consider it of no more importance than the Island of Anticosti. If our most important business is to be settled by arbitration, our Cabinet Minister might as well step down and out.

BRANCH RAILWAYS SACRIFICED.

MR. PETERS says that it is not intended to submit the question of the construction of Railway branches to arbitration. He is only to have arbitration to settle the amount to be paid to the Province to compensate it for not having received a fair share of public works up to the present time. Does he think the people are so gullible as not to perceive that the latter question completely absorbs the former one. If Mr. Peters is to be paid in cash a sum that will represent the Island's share of past Federal expenditure on Public Works, such as Railways and Canals, how can he ask at the same time for Public Works in P. E. Island to equalize the same expenditure? We cannot eat our loaf and have it.

CAN HE BE TRUSTED?

In his Lyceum speech, as well as during the whole election campaign of the autumn of 1893, Mr. Peters declared that taxation was "a long way off," that the ordinary resources of the Province were far from exhausted, and that no taxes would be imposed until the people were consulted at the polls. These declarations were made to the public during the month of December, 1893. The election took place less than three weeks before the end of the financial year of 1893. Mr. Peters knew exactly how the accounts stood. Yet he deliberately led the people to believe that taxation was unnecessary. When making these statements he knew that the deficit of the then current year was approaching \$120,000. He got his election by the grossest deception; and a few weeks after it was over, he announced his scheme of taxation. Is this man to be trusted again?

ARE THEY AFRAID TO FACE THE MUSIC?

Though courteously invited to be present at the meeting of citizens held last evening for the purpose of discussing their record and the political issues of the day, Messrs. Rogers and Prowse were not there. Having issued a card to the electors in which they state that "Our record as representatives of the district during the past four years is before you," and "we are in accord with the platform of the Local Government as laid down in the address of the leader," these worthy gentlemen seem to think that they have advanced reasons sufficiently strong to ensure their re-election. They silently follow their leader and they expect the electors to silently follow them. Messrs. Rogers and Prowse prefer the one-man government to being "haunted over the coals" at a political meeting. The preference of a majority of the electors will be shown on election day.

WHITTLED DOWN.

The Patriot commends the activity of Mr. Premier Peters. He is "not letting the grass grow under his feet." He is a veritable Napoleon of Provincial Politics—speaking in all the three Counties and inspiring his Liberal followers. We have no doubt that the Patriot speaks of that which it knows. Mr. Peters is the one-man power of the Government and there's evidence in its article of last evening that Mr. Peters has been very close to the editorial elbow. With all the special pleading in it, we see nothing about Mrs. Whalens pension or the claim arising out of excessive railway expenditures. Mr. Peters and the Patriot have dropped those out of the discussion of the arbitration scheme and confine their attention to the claim arising out of the fact that the tunnel has not been built. It must be admitted that Mr. Peter's big arbitration proposal has been considerably whittled down.
