

Midsummer Examinations.

UPPER PRINCE STREET SCHOOL.

This is the largest school in the town, the number on the roll being 625, the daily average attendance 470, the percentage of attendance 81, and the number of teachers 10.

It is also the most interesting, inasmuch as all the teachers and nearly all the pupils belong to the fairer and the better sex.

For this reason, no doubt, the visitors to-day were literally "too numerous to mention."

The classes in the various rooms were examined by Dr. Anderson, Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Robinson, and others, as well as by the teachers of the staff; and we heard, on all sides, commendations of the classes and their instructors—the tone and discipline of the school being particularly noticeable.

At twelve o'clock the school was massed in the upper hall. The attendance of both pupils and visitors was so large that seats for some of the former were obtained with the utmost difficulty, while many of the latter were compelled to stand throughout the entertainment.

The hour of daily attendance will be from 1 to 2 o'clock, p. m.

The course of instruction will include the following useful information:— 1st. How to make a purely vegetable wine, without grapes, which will be both healthy and economical.

2nd. The method of planting vines; of cutting slips for sale, and of cultivating them in order to hasten the ripening of the fruit three weeks before the usual time; also the manner of covering grape vines in autumn to protect them during winter.

3rd. How to make wine with grapes, with full instructions on the necessary utensils for this work.

4th. To make cider with apples. 5th. To cultivate grain and vegetables. 6th. The manner of grafting and pruning all kinds of trees. 7th. To tastefully arrange flower gardens and grass plots.
