UNITED STATES AND SPAIN.

Situation Practically Unchanged

Spanish Concessions Insufficient

NO MORE WILL BE OFFERED.

War Considered Inevitable.

Outline of the United States Plan of Campaign.

WASHINGTON, April 9.—The situation remains unchanged. Little transpired yesterday to indicate that the country is on the brink of war; and yet the resolve was evidently firmer than ever that unless Spain yields to America's Cuban demands the United States, by force of arms, will move on Havana.

What is going on at Madrid gives slight hope of such concessions there as will alter the present situation. There are no negotiations in the sense of exchange on pending propositions. Both parties apparently have said their last word concerning their respective propositions.

The President's message will go on on Monday, and in the meantime it will be strengthened in tone.

The message will be made to fit the Foraker resolution leaving out the recognition of the Cuban republic. Unless Spain backs down, either before or after it is adopted by Congress, the United States will be prepared to make the armed intervention for which it provides vigorously and promptly so as to end the conflict, if possible, at an early day, as the President is hopeful can be done by cutting off Spain's basis of supply through sending the Key West squadron and an auxiliary fleet to Cuba and the flying squadron to Porto Rico, capturing such Spanish ships as they may encounter and covering the landing of supplies for the Cubans.

MADRID, April 9.—Members of the Cabinet are unanimous in considering that Spain has reached the limit of international policy in the direction of conceding the demands of the United States.

NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

The Invalids Recovering.

Ottawa Deserted by the Politicians.

OTTAWA, April 9.—Premier Laurier is recovering from a bronchial attack and expects to be out in a few days. Hon. Messrs. Tarte and Foster are also recovering. Very few members are now in town.

TORONTO, April 8.—United States Consul Sewell is receiving numerous letters of application from Canadians and from United States citizens living in Canada, who are desirous of fighting against Spain in case of hostilities, and they want to know how to go about it. The consul says the United States government is not encouraging this sort of thing. Among the applicants are mechanics, sailors, engineers and physicians. Their only course is to go to the other side and enlist.

BRILLIANT VICTORY.

Dervishes in Full Retreat.

Anglo-Egyptian Force in Pursuit.

SEVERAL BRITISH OFFICERS KILLED AND WOUNDED.

Full Loss Not Stated.

CAIRO, April 9.—Reports of the defeat of the Dervishes in Nubia show that the Anglo-Egyptian force after a night march arrived at dawn before the enemy's camp. When the trenches of the Dervishes had been bombarded the whole Anglo-Egyptian force made a brilliant rush for the zereba and the trenches. The Dervishes stood their ground bravely and reserved their fire until the attacking force was quite close to them.

Shahmond, the Dervish General, is among the prisoners captured.

As this despatch was being sent the Anglo-Egyptian Cavalry, Horse Artillery, and Maxim batteries were pressing the fugitives.

The losses of the Anglo-Egyptian force included Capt. Urguhart, of the Cameron Highlanders, and Lieut. Gore, of the Seaforth Highlanders killed, and ten officers of the British brigade and four British officers in the Egyptian service wounded.

TROOPS FOR JAMAICA.

Regimental Change at Halifax.

HALIFAX, April 9.—Orders have been received by the Leinster Regiment in garrison here to leave for Jamaica on May 5th, to strengthen the West India garrison and give a better sense of security in the troublesome on times that threaten.

A regiment will come here from England to replace the Leinesters.

NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

LONDON, April 7.—A special despatch from Rome, published yesterday, says contracts were signed during the day for the sale of three torpedo boats to the United States, and for the sale of the armored cruiser Giuseppe Garibaldi to Spain and for the sale of the armored cruiser Varese to the Argentine Republic.

English papers are commenting upon the fact that the commander of the First Egyptian Brigade is Brig-Gen. MacDonald, and the brigade major, his chief of staff, is Major Keith Falconer. Gen. MacDonald, an Inverness-shire man, commenced life as a draper's assistant at Aberdeen but exchanged the measuring yard of a shopman for the rifle of a private in the Gordon Highlanders, and at one of the first engagements fought by Lord Roberts' little army on its march to Kabul, he distinguished himself in such fashion as to be offered the choice between the Victoria Cross and a commission. He chose the latter, and now the quondam draper's assistant wears the sword of an Egyptian general. Major Keith Falconer is a brother of the Earl of Kintore, who now represents the ancient and noble family of the Keiths; the last of whom was Frederick the Great's celebrated field marshal, who fell at Hochkirch.
