"Special Speaker At Men's Assoc. In Georgetown. The April meeting of St. David's Association took place in the Georgetown Church Hall on April 5, with the president, Mr. H. Yorston, in the chair. The excellent supper provided by the ladies of the W. A. was duly enjoyed by the members. Hymns were sung, and a short business session was held.

The special speaker was the Rev. Father Cotton whose subject was his experience of Africa during the years of his ministry in that country.

As a brother of the Community of the Resurrection, founded by Bishop Gore, he was posted to South Africa from England in 1911. Father Cotton presented a brief outline of celibate ministry from the earliest Christian missionaries up to present-day requirements, in which he believes both celibate and married clergy are equally necessary to the progress of missions.

He gave a comprehensive picture of the working conditions in Africa during his many years service. It was about the beginning of his sojourn there, that the natives had been encouraged and trained to work in the gold-mines, taking the place of Chinese coolies who had previously provided all labor in the mines. In this way, there was always a concentration of about 400,000 natives in the areas round Johannesburg, which formed an excellent nucleus for the start of a missionary field. Although witch doctors held great influence over the masses, their doctrine had in one way prepared the mind of the natives for the infiltration of Christianity, since they were more readily able to grasp spiritual concepts.

Before 1913 the natives were encouraged to share the land, and work on their own behalf, under their Boer landlords. Since that legislation has forced them all to positions of the lowest servility, with no possible opportunity for the better themselves. In fact, the trend at present is absolute segregation, even to such lengths as a separate and inferior education for the Africans, as opposed to that given the whites. This threatens state of affairs is most offensive to a people who have shown themselves capable in many instances of equal intellectualty with the so-called superior races; having produced doctors, registered nurses, ordained clergy, and members of parliament.

In 1949 Lyndon Hartog Daisy in the herd of Jack Wauchope, Schomberg, Ontario, established the world record for twice-a-day milking production of 1,324 lbs. fat, and in 1950 Triumph made 1,365 lbs.

Third High Record. This is Stardust's third record above 1,000 lbs. fat, she having made 1,029 lbs. as a six-year-old, 1,063 lbs. as a seven-year-old, and 1,317 lbs. in her current lactation. She has lifetime total to date of 125,210 lbs. milk containing 5,704 lbs. fat, average test 4.56% butterfat. This total was made in six lactations, with all her records on three-times-a-day milking.

Stardust is a good individual as well as a great producer, having been classified as Very Good, the second highest rating attainable for conformation.

There was nothing unusual in the handling of Stardust. She was not given a box stall until it was noticed after her record had been in progress for nine months that she was doing better than the previous year. She was then milked by hand, and humoured somewhat with feed. Given what she seemed to like best, it was decided that one of her favourite snacks was a gallon of raw potatoes.

Herdsman's Statement. Herdsman Walter Darrach says that he could have had a good deal more milk from her if she had been hand milked throughout the year, and if he had had time to give her particular attention. She is in good shape at the present time, and he hopes to make another big record with her. At the moment he is concentrating on her daughter, Abegweit Firefly, who is currently producing around 25 per cent higher than during her last lactation when she made 937 lbs. fat after having calved with twin heifers.

Of Stardust's four sons, one, Abegweit Blueblood has been retained in the Jones herd as here sire, while two, Abegweit Jupiter and Abegweit Limgel are owned by the Hamilton and District Cattle Breeding Association Artificial Unit, and the fourth, Abegweit Neptune, is owned by Harold Bradford, Dunville, Ontario.

Other great records include those of Countess Abberkerk Hlemke, who back in 1920's established a Canadian record for three-times-a-day milking of 30,443 lbs. milk containing 1,101 lbs. fat and Abegweit Milady, whose record of 1,065 lbs. fat from 24,939 lbs. milk is a world championship mark over all ages and classes and regardless of times milked daily for butterfat production in 305 days.

Continued from page 1. TCA North Star crash scene. By noon, 20 bodies had been found. City police, RCMP and RCMP police stood guard over them where they lay on the golf course. Bulldozers began moving through wreckage of Hume home in case some of passengers' bodies might have fallen there.

Wing Dropped. Car dealer Mac McKay said he saw the North Star in trouble over the golf course. "It was smoking and while I watched a wing dropped," he said. "There was an explosion at about 3,000 or 4,000 feet but the plane didn't disintegrate. We heard another explosion after the plane had fallen out of sight. I didn't see the Harvard at all."

The crash occurred in clear, mild weather. It was sunny with cloudy intervals in Moose Jaw, the temperature in the area was 40° and the wind was from the west at 10 to 15 mph.

Thursday's serious collision TCA has had in 12 years—the first involving one of its fleet of Montreal-built North Stars.

Twelve were killed when a TCA plane crashed at Armstrong, Ont., in 1941: 15 when a TCA plane disappeared just before it was due to land at Vancouver April 29, 1947.

Worst Disaster. No other crash of a scheduled Canadian air liner caused as many deaths as Thursday's collision.

Most fatalities in a single crash in Canada occurred Jan. 25, 1950, when a U. S. transport crashed in the Yukon and 44 were killed. In 1951 a Canadian Pacific Airlines plane on military transport service between Canada and the Far East crashed on the Pacific coast with 38 victims.

The North Star was TCA's flight from Montreal to Vancouver via Toronto, Winnipeg and Calgary. It left Toronto four hours late early Thursday, delayed by intense thunderstorms in western and northern Ontario.

Frank Fish of Moose Jaw said he saw the North Star, still several hours late, flying due west and a Harvard flying north.

"They were coming together very slowly while I was watching," he said. "The Harvard seemed to be high enough that they wouldn't crash. [But then I saw both planes falling.]"

Bodies were found over an area of several city blocks.

Mrs. Hadwen was alone in the Hume house when the North Star hit. She visited the dentist saved Mrs. Hume and her two children. Mr. Hume was at work.

By early evening 36 bodies had been recovered.

Courses in School Administration

The seventh and last in a series of short courses on the administration of the rural school was held yesterday afternoon and evening at Hunter River. Communities represented were Milton, Greenvale, Rennie's Road, North Rustico, Oyster Bed Bridge, Rustico Cross, New Glasgow, Fredericton and Hunter River.

The courses were very well attended throughout in spite of poor travelling conditions. A total of over five hundred persons were present at the seven courses held at Murray River, Souris, Mount Stewart, Vernon River, Alberton, Kensington and Hunter River, an indication of the interest in school matters.

Discussion, demonstration and participation by all concerned were features of the courses. Afternoon sessions were occupied with the preparation and planning necessary for a good annual school meeting and the conduct of meetings. The usual procedure was for the groups to stage a baby run school meeting, examine its defects then run through a well prepared meeting. Many useful suggestions for improvement on the present routine of the school meeting were advanced by the participants. A concluding feature of the afternoon session was discussion in small groups of the question how best to create interest in the annual meeting and ensure attendance by the whole community.

Evening Sessions. Evening sessions were opened with a film Schools and the Community, followed by small group discussion on the good and bad points of the one room rural school. Reports from each group were presented and discussed. A second group discussion turned over the question "If you were given the job of improving education in P. E. I., and didn't have to worry too much about the cost what changes would you make?"

Reports given at each course had a remarkable degree of similarity. Dissatisfaction with the ten grade rural school was evident. Most felt that the teacher supply problem could only be solved by higher salaries and better standards in training. Many proposed removing the last two or three grades from the rural school and transporting the pupils to regional high schools. There was a considerable interest in the larger unit of school administration.

The latter part of the evening sessions were given over to general questions: textbooks, land evaluation, tax assessment, school property improvement, were a few of the matters raised.

Continued from page 1. BRITISH AND FRENCH. In Paris, a government official said it is of "utmost importance" that the Western powers clearly define their views before meeting Soviet and Chinese Communist delegates at Geneva.

Premier Joseph Laniel's government last month pledged in parliament to seek a negotiated settlement of the war in Indo-China. French officials fear this pledge openly conflicts with apparent U. S. desire for a military victory as the only way to end the war.

Laniel promised Thursday night he would make a statement on the issue to the National Assembly this afternoon just before it begins a four-week Easter recess.

The French foreign ministry Thursday night denied press reports that the government has rejected Dulles' proposal for a solemn, five-nation warning to Communist China to keep "hands off" Indo-China. The five-nation plan, to include the United States, Britain, France, Australia and New Zealand, is among the measures suggested under Dulles' "united action" policy.

Home & School At Georgetown

The monthly meeting of the Georgetown Home and School Association took place April 1, with the president, Mrs. E. Easton, in the chair.

The ways and means committee introduced a plan for a concert in the near future. The program to consist of films, special numbers, and a presentation by the three school groups of their Music Festival pieces. This received the general approval of the meeting. A room with piano in a members home was offered to Mrs. McLure for extra training of entrants before the Festival. A timely report was received from the Health committee, and steps taken to counter the minor problems encountered. The retiring committee named the ladies to take their places during the month of April, namely: Mrs. C. Fraser and Mrs. P. MacDonald.

The report of the district nurse concerning her findings at Georgetown school was read to the members, also letters from Provincial headquarters. Mr. J. B. Scully reported that the Dental Clinic will then run through a well prepared meeting. Many useful suggestions for improvement on the present routine of the school meeting were advanced by the participants. A concluding feature of the afternoon session was discussion in small groups of the question how best to create interest in the annual meeting and ensure attendance by the whole community.

Evening Sessions. Evening sessions were opened with a film Schools and the Community, followed by small group discussion on the good and bad points of the one room rural school. Reports from each group were presented and discussed. A second group discussion turned over the question "If you were given the job of improving education in P. E. I., and didn't have to worry too much about the cost what changes would you make?"

Reports given at each course had a remarkable degree of similarity. Dissatisfaction with the ten grade rural school was evident. Most felt that the teacher supply problem could only be solved by higher salaries and better standards in training. Many proposed removing the last two or three grades from the rural school and transporting the pupils to regional high schools. There was a considerable interest in the larger unit of school administration.

The latter part of the evening sessions were given over to general questions: textbooks, land evaluation, tax assessment, school property improvement, were a few of the matters raised.

The course, the first of its kind sponsored by the Department of Education, provided an excellent forum for exchange of ideas and will probably be continued at a later date. The Director of Education, Dr. L. W. Shaw, the Assistant Director, Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, Mr. Edward MacPhail, Director of Correspondence Courses, and school inspectors Mr. Louis Herring, Mr. Harold Hynes, Mr. Merritt Callaghan, Mr. C. B. Jelly, and Mr. Wilson Ross attended as time and opportunity permitted and answered questions relating to administration and
