

# Osteen Meets Bunker In 3rd. World Series Game

BALTIMORE (AP)—The confident Baltimore Orioles will send 21-year-old Wally Bunker after their third straight World Series victory today against Claude Osteen, the veteran lefty who pulled Los Angeles Dodgers out of a similar tailspin last October.

Welcomed home early Friday by 4,000 fans and feled in a parade through the downtown streets, the Orioles have turned Baltimore into a baseball-crazy city now.

**NEW ARE FAVORITES**

By beating Don Drysdale and Sandy Koufax in the first two games at Dodger Stadium, the Orioles have moved from 8-5 underdogs to 2-1 favorites to take it all. Many are talking of closing out the Dodgers in four straight.

A capacity crowd of 55,000 is expected for Baltimore's first World Series game. A clear day with pleasantly warm temperatures has been forecast.

Game time is 1 p.m. EDT. Sunday's fourth game of the best-of-seven series starts at 2 p.m. EDT.

The two baseball clubs, who arrived during the night from Los Angeles after Thursday's comedy of six Dodger errors, visited Memorial Stadium on the off day. It was the first look at the park for many of the Dodgers, who are more comfortable in their spacious home park. It is only 309 feet down the foul lines in this park and 410 feet in deepest center.

The way the Dodgers have been playing they would be more at home in a hotel room with the shades pulled down to keep out the sunshine.

They have made six errors

and are hitting only .115 with just seven base hits. Baltimore is hitting .246, playing errorless ball and getting strong pitching with a 1.00 earned run average.

**WOULD BE A FIRST**

If the Dodgers can come back after losing two at home they will be the first to do it. Other teams that lost the first two and then came back to win had

dropped the pair on the road. They were the 1955 and 1965 Dodgers and the 1956 and 1958 New York Yankees.

In 1921 the winning New York Giants lost the first two to the Yankees in the Polo Ground but

all of the games were played in the Polo Grounds that year. "It's not so much where you play," said manager Walter Alton of the Dodgers. "We've just got to play better baseball."

The Dodgers had a meeting before their workout Friday, reviewing the scouting report on the Orioles with special emphasis on Dave Johnson and Boog Powell.

"A lot of things happened to us this year that never happened before," said Koufax. "This isn't over yet."

Alton admitted he never had seen his club look as bad as it did in the two losing efforts at home. The record-tying six errors and the record-breaking three misplays by centre fielder Willie Davis in one inning were shockers.

**WALLY BUNKER**

BALTIMORE (AP)—Wally Bunker, a fierce competitor with a deceiving but hum attitude, pitches for Baltimore Orioles today when they resume the World Series against Los Angeles Dodgers.

Bunker always gives the appearance of being lackadaisical on the mound. But he battles the hitters and isn't afraid to brush them back from the plate on occasion.

**RELIES ON CONTROL**

"I don't throw as hard as Drabowsky or Palmer," Bunker said. "I rely more on control. But after seeing the success their fast balls had in the first two games, I don't think I'll worry about aiming for corners. I just want to get more on the pitch and make sure it's a strike."

After winning 10 games as a rookie in 1965, Bunker slipped to 10-8 last season while suffering from shoulder pains. He was 10-6 this year and an ailing right elbow sent him to the disabled list late in August.

During his last three starts, Bunker has had no packs applied to his elbow between innings. He gets the hot packs for 15 minutes on days he doesn't pitch.

**CLAUDE DID IT IN '65**

Alton called on Osteen to turn the tide. It was Osteen, a 27-year-old lefty with a 17-14 record, who got the Dodgers back into the Series last year by shutting out Minnesota Twins (4-0) in the third game after the Twins had whipped Drysdale and Koufax in the first two.

"Osteen is a great competitor," said Alton. "He has great spirit and great poise. I've never seen him upset. Most of his games are battles but he keeps firing."

Hank Bauer, whose Orioles are riding high, picked the right-handed Bunker and Dave McNally, his first-game starter, to work the next two games.

Undoubtedly he will return to Jim Palmer, Thursday's shut-out winner, if he needs a fifth-game pitcher.

The Orioles, of course, have a golden opportunity to close it out at home by winning two of the next three or two straight at Memorial Stadium. The sixth and seventh, if necessary, will be played at Los Angeles following another off day for travel.

Bunker is the third young man from Bauer's fussy, checkered pitching staff to get a start. Palmer, 20, became the youngest ever to pitch a Series shutout in the second game.

**HURT ELBOW**

Bunker was on the disabled list from July 27 to Aug. 15 due to tendinitis in his right elbow. He has won only one game since July 27 and owns a 10-8 season record with a 4.29 earned run average. He worked five shutout innings against Minnesota last Sunday, but his elbow still was sore.

The big hitter of the Series so far is Dave Johnson, the Orioles' second baseman, with a .500 average.

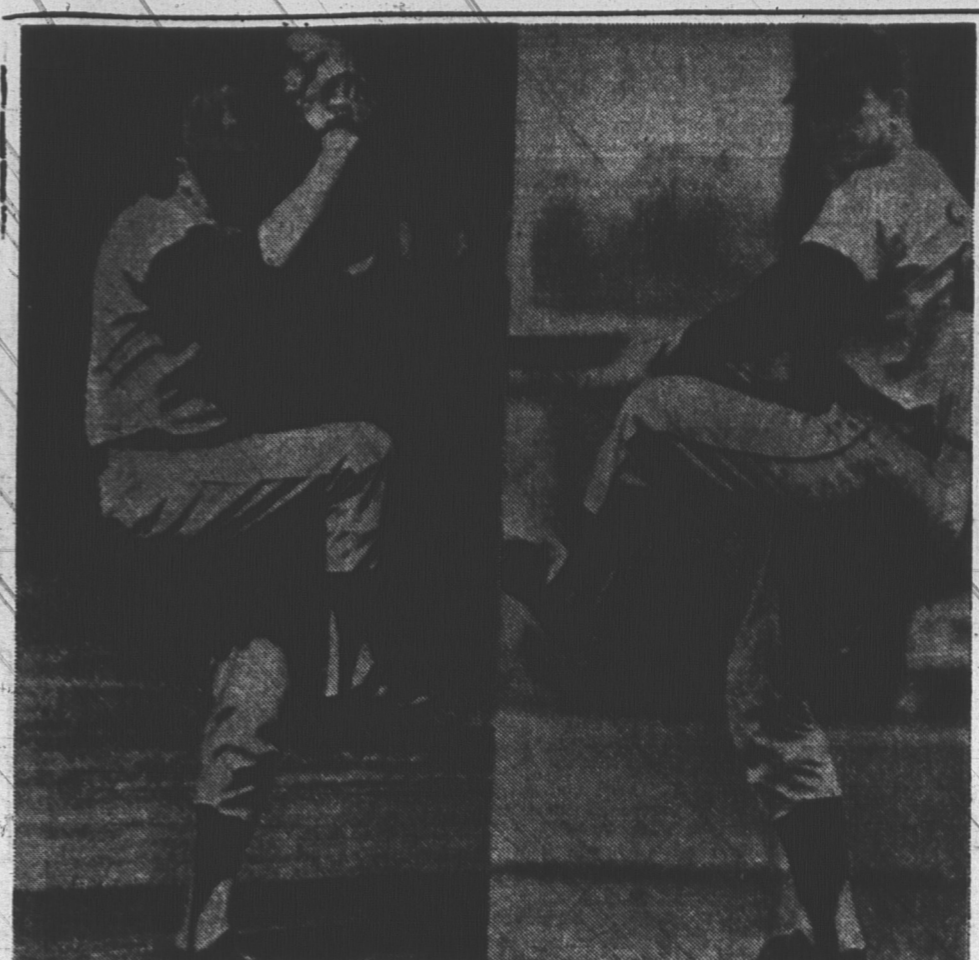

## Nicklaus And Player Will Meet For World Match

WENTWORTH, England (AP) Favored Jack Nicklaus held off a rally by Bill Casper and South Africa's Gary Player charged stronger than Arnold Palmer for similar 2 and 1 victories Friday that carried them into the final of the world matched play golf tournament.

They will meet over 36 holes today on Wentworth's 6,977-yard, par 74 West course for the \$14,000 first prize and the title won a year ago by Player.

Nicklaus, the Masters and British champion, fired a seven-under-par 67 and grabbed a six-hole lead at the end of the morning round but he had to hold on for dear life when Casper, the U.S. open king from San Diego, Calif., regained his putting touch in the afternoon.

Plaser and Palmer played almost stroke for stroke in finishing all square after the first 18 with sparking 68s but the South African proved steeper in the wild finish.

There appeared to be two decisive shots in this exciting match. At the 190-yard 28th, Player hit a five-iron six feet from the cup and sank for a birdie 2, going two holes ahead. Two holes later, Palmer missed a five-foot putt to fall 3-down.

There was no catching Player after that.

During the morning round Nicklaus was outdriving Casper by as much as 50 yards and Casper, rated one of the game's greatest putters, couldn't find his touch. Casper soared to a 78, six shots worse than Nicklaus' score.

In the afternoon, however,

Casper, sinking good putts went out in 32, four-under-par, and picked up four holes on the big bomber from Columbus, Ohio.

Only 2-up at the 27th, Nicklaus won the 29th with a par but Casper came back with a birdie at the 32nd where he rolled in a 25-foot putt.

Casper cut the lead to a single hole with a 12-footer at the 34th but came to the end of his comeback at the 35th. There, big Jack reached the green with a drive and a five-iron and two-putted for a four. Casper, 40 yards short of the green on his second, had to settle for a five.

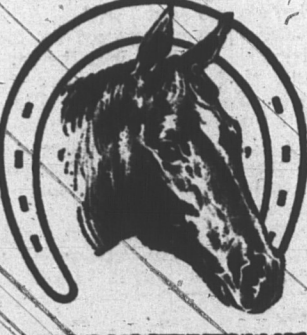
**COLT DIDN'T RAVE IT**
