

# Commission Said 'Two Big Ears'

"Two big ears, one English the other French" was the co-chairman Davidson Danton and Andre Laurendeau described the Royal Commission on Bilingualism and Biculturalism in an interview last night.

The chairman are spending a week touring the Maritimes, visiting the provincial premier and community leaders, prior to the start of formal hearings in mid-March.

They said that the problem of biculturalism is "complex" and "differs from place to place. On the prairies for example," said Mr. Laurendeau, "the problem is not bicultural, but multi-cultural, with various ethnic groups other than English and French predominant in the population."

## Legacy To Cancer Society Provides New Treatment

A Gold Seed Implantation Gun to be used in the treatment of cancer has been purchased for use in Prince Edward Island hospitals.

Dr. Temple Hoopes, speaking at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Division of the Canadian Cancer Society last evening at the Charlottetown Hotel, described the gun which was paid for by part of a legacy from the late Janet Dick Webster, a legacy which was shared jointly with three other organizations.

He described the use of the isotope laboratory at the Hospital for which \$7,000 was provided by the Island division of the society two years ago.

Frank F. MacEachern, Toronto, national campaign chairman, and George Pifer, OSE, national secretary - treasurer, were special guests at the meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel. Dr. Hoopes spoke of the many cancer research projects underway in Canada and of the important discoveries and developments emanating from this research.

He stated that approximately \$4,000,000 is needed in 1964 to finance support of the more than 90 research projects in this country. Although not everyone is a scientist, a bio-chemist, he said, everyone can share in this important work by providing the necessary funds for those qualified to do the research.

Mr. MacEachern said that because of the efforts of the Cancer Society, improved diagnosis, treatment and care had been achieved and an improved attitude and understanding of this disease had been brought about, helping to reduce suffering and encouraging early diagnosis.

## S' side Centennial Plans Outlined

This Prince County capital will certainly have a colorful and event-filled 1964 if any indication can be gained from the latest planning developments announced last night by the Summerside Centennial Committee.

Tom Richardson, reporting for the lighting and decorating committee, announced several finalized plans all of which will be put to a public hearing, atmosphere in the town. They show the committee's efforts to make Summerside the best centennial town in the province.

Lighting displays have been planned by several firms and individuals but Mr. Richardson said last night that the latest idea came from members of the United Church who are hoping to light their stained glass windows from inside after dark this year. The standard street lighting in the town will also be improved with new lamps being installed so that they project out over the streets as in the business district of Summerside. These lights will extend both east and west on Water Street, and also on the road towards St. Eleonors.

The total cost of these decorations and fixtures is expected to be about \$5,400 and the cost will be shared by Summerside and the Provincial Centennial Committee in Charlottetown which has offered to pay 30 cents per candle if Summerside will provide the remainder.

Dominion Day celebrations came up for much discussion at the meeting the main points being the type of parade for the occasion and what time the opening ceremonies should take place at the centennial fountain.

Residents of St. Eleonors were told last evening at the village's annual meeting that the 1964 centennial project of the village was a tree-planting program.

Chief Cannon, chairman of the village commissioners, said that 400 shade trees have already been ordered and that 12 men from the Department of Forestry along with Town Council members and volunteers survey the village and present a plan showing where trees should be planted to provide the most shade.

It is hoped that this project will be done in early spring under the winter work programs.

In his report, Mr. Cannon noted that the rate of growth in 1963 had not followed the trend of previous years. He also mentioned that \$13,950 in building permits had been issued last year.
