OTTAWA, Sept. 24. When the House met yesterday, Lister moved that his charges against Haggart be referred to a special committee to investigate.

Haggart flatly denied the truth of the charges. He said that the same charges had been made in 1880 before a royal commission of enquiry into matters relating to the Canadian Pacific Railway...

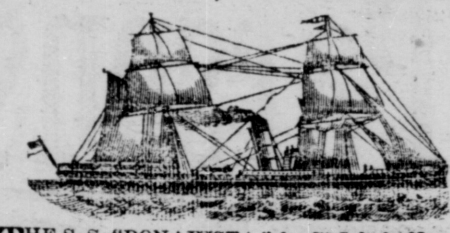
