OYSTER FISHERIES

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL, Prince Edward Island, 23rd April, 1906.

Applications for leases of barren bottoms of Bays, Rivers, Harbors or Creeks in this Province for the cultivation of Oysters must be made to the Lieutenant Governor in Council and forwarded to the Clerk of the Executive Council, Charlottetown.

Applications must be accompanied by a plan and description designating with reasonable accuracy the location of the bottoms desired. No greater area than five acres will be leased to any one person. Owners of the land fronting on the beds of Bays, Rivers, Harbors or Creeks have the first claim to such leases.

Persons desiring of obtaining copies of a paper on Oyster Culture by Captain Barnes Kemp, Dominion Oyster Expert, or of the Prince Edward Island Fishery Act can obtain same on application to the undersigned.

NEWS OF THE HORSES FROM ALL SOURCES

THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT has reappointed the Royal Commission on Horse-breeding to ascertain how best to expend the King's premiums at the chief agricultural shows, in order to advance the horse-breeding interests.

ONE OF THE best-proportioned, handsome and best-finished yearling fillies that we have ever seen is owned by J. M. Johnson, president of the New England Breeders' Association, and is at Johnson (formerly Forbes) Farm, Milton. She is by Bingen (2003), and her dam is May Fern (2113), hence is a full sister of Lord Revelstoke (9) (1212).

DAVID REID, Victoria Cross, has purchased from L. A. Wright, Salisbury, N. B. the pure-bred Clydesdale stallion Cospat, 19714, imported from Scotland by Robert Ness, Hawick, Quebec; weight 1700 lbs., 9 years old by Prince of Kyle 7165, by Prince of Wales, Dam Jennie, by Johnny Style, 6977, by Danley, 223. He is a fine looking animal and no doubt will be a taking horse among breeders of Clydesdale stock.

IT IS NOT WORK SO MUCH as fatigue that wears a horse out. It is the strain he is subjected to in order to accomplish just a little more than he can do with ease that puts him out of condition and cuts the years off his life. Particularly is this the case in spring when he is first put to steady work. Gradual increase of work, along with increase of feed, toughens, making him more efficient, and injuring him in no way. It is the injudicious crowding which tries his wind, lathers him up, calls his shoulders and neck, and soon makes him a plug.

SOME FANCY PRICES paid for

English horses have been: Flying Fox, bought by M. Blanc \$10,000; Ormonde, bought by W. O'Brien \$10,000; St. Blaise, bought by Augustus Belmont, \$10,000; Medler, bought by W. H. Forbes, \$72,500. The champion low-priced thoroughbred was Maxime Gomez which was bought for \$1, and afterward won \$30,000 for his owners.

American horses that have brought fancy prices have been: Hamburg, bought by W. C. Whitney, \$30,000; Nasarutium, bought by W. C. Whitney, \$57,000; Hamburg, repurchased by Harry Payne Whitney, \$70,000; Hermit, bought by E. R. Thomas, \$30,000.

ANY HORSEMAN WHO will visit the stock farms also trotting tracks in this vicinity, and examine the get of Bingen (2003) must be convinced that Bingen has founded a remarkable family of trotters not improbably the greatest ever known. The writer saw Bingen when he landed in Boston, and then never seen so good a set of limbs and feet under any coat of hair. We looked him over a few days ago and his limbs and feet are just as sound and clean today as when we saw him as a yearling. There is not a puff or plump on him. Considering that he trotted a quarter in 35 seconds, as a yearling, was campaigned and trotted a mile in 2:12 as a two-year-old, and was finally raced to a record of 2:06, it must be conceded that he is one of the most remarkable trotting stallions yet produced. Ex.

THE PROOF OF the prophet is in the fulfillment and he who makes good is not wise if he falleth to "holer." It is not unlikely when Bingen (2003) sold at auction for \$32,000 there were many people who thought he brought too high a price although they may not have noted the sentiment which at least one of our journals did. Writing in the department we were editing at that time we remember saying in effect, "That talk of Bingen brought an unwarranted price seems fallacious and utterly lacking in logic. It will be judgment in due time that cool deliberation based upon a collection of hard cold facts, led to his purchase and that as a business proposition the purchaser had all the best of the argument."

Bingen is this year limited strictly to 40 approved mares most, if not all, of which are already booked, and when his stud duties have been concluded for the season, he will owe his breeder nothing. Ex.

A VERY LARGE AND handsome draft stallion was seen of the streets Friday last, which attracted considerable attention. On enquiry it was ascertained to be "Young Barrister," which had been brought back to his native land by Mr. C. McLean of Mount Herbert, his former owner who was accepted into selling him by a big offer from Wiliam Dlesley of Canning, N. S., two years ago. This horse's stock has turned out so well that Mr. McLean was prevailed upon by the horsemen here to bring him back to the Island. In order to do so he had to pay a large figure for him, as he is considered the most successful stockgetter in N. S., today. His sire, "Barrister," the undisputed king of draft horses in the Provinces and his dam the "Myosotis" sired by Scotland's king of draft horses "McGregor," has produced a worthy descendant, which has proved himself to be the equal of his sire as a producer of valuable draft stock. This valuable mare was selected by C. C. Gardiner and F. Boyer in Scotland several years ago and is still owned by Mr. Boyer.

IT IS A VERY common question about the scabby legs on some heavy-draft horses. Black oil, rubbed in often, is the best thing known of, and also the cheapest. Get your veterinarian to prescribe for their blood, or give the following: One pound soda, 1/2 pound gentian, 1/2 pound saltpetre, 1/2 pound sulphur, 1/2 pound copperas, 1 pound flax meal; 1 tablespoonful twice a day.

Another man wants to know says a writer in The Farmer's Advocate about a lump on a colt's stifle; I can tell him from experience. I have one (coming two years old now) which got that way when six weeks old. He had soft puff front. Veterinarian said it was joint-ill and gave me some liniment, but the colt got worse. When I weaned her, I put her in a large box stall, and she got all right, and is sound now. They don't need anything but exercise; and that was the way with a neighbor's colt also. Keep them alone; others will hurt them over again.

It might give a few other hints on the horse, says the same writer. If your horse is high-headed, in putting on the bridle, likely the bridle is too short. Make it long enough, and get your horse, and he will likely be all right; and if not, use a snap on one side so you can put on the bridle, putting the bit in his mouth after. If he will not open his mouth after you get the right hand. We will supply for the bit, try this plan: We will adjust the right hand. Now take the bit between the thumb and forefinger of the left; pass up between the lips until the bite strikes the teeth. Now turn the end of your left finger down so the nail will press into the lower jaw behind the nippers and he will open his mouth, and the trick is done. I have tried it on horses that had the habit very badly, and they soon yield.

THE PACING MARE Alfalfa, 2111-1427 Argot Wilkes, that was the wonder of the half-mile tracks last season, has been bought by J. H. Bronson of New Haven, Ct., who owned Searchlight, 20314 in his palmy days, and has been sent to the Brooklyn trainer Tommy Murphy, who is just now regarded as one of the very best men engaged in training and driving trotters, and pacers. Murphy first came into the notice of the Grand Circuit followers two or three years ago, with the pacing mare Hetty G., that had been regarded as out-classed, but that he raced successfully, reducing her record from 2:05. 1/4 to 2:04. 1/4. Last season he took Locanda and reduced his record to 2:02; gave the trotting mare Deloree a record of 2:09. 1/4 and drove the three-year old trotting filly Susie N., by Moko, to a record of 2:00. 1/4. Alfalfa started out green last year, and in twenty races she was never behind the money, winning eleven of them, getting second in five, third in two, and fourth in two. She was taken to Columbus and in the mile-track class and was second in 2:05. 1/4 in a field of crack-jacks, which indicates that she will be able to give anything not faster than a 2:04 pacer a race this season. In Murphy's hands the chestnut filly will get a careful preparation and the best of driving, so that she likely to be one of the pacing stars of 1906.
