## THE GREAT TROUBLE IN CHINA

No Additional Definite News

INCREASINGLY SERIOUS STATE OF AFFAIRS.

A Big British Military Vote Expected—Salisbury Silent.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, July 17, 3.53 a. m.—Up to this hour there has been no further news received regarding the reported massacre at Peking from any source.

In the House of Commons last evening, beyond the admission that there was no ground for hoping that the report was not true, Mr. Broderick, Parliamentary Secretary to the Foreign Office, had nothing to communicate.

No question was put to Lord Salisbury in the House of Lords, probably by preconcerted arrangement, it being considered that at the present stage of affairs it would only be embarrassing to force the Premier to make a statement.

It is whispered on the ministerial side of the House of Commons that the next vote asked for on account of the military undertaking in South Africa and China will be startling in amount.

Telegrams from Shanghai and Chefoo indicate an increasingly serious state of affairs.

It is alleged that the Powers mean war. There is little doubt that a further check of the allies at Tien Tsin would be the signal for a general anti-foreign rising throughout China.

The Times says: "It is taken for granted in diplomatic circles that when the Chinese crisis is settled, Great Britain will retain its right to nominate the Inspector of Chinese Customs."

TWENTY CANADIANS

Plundered While Seeking Cover in China.

TORONTO, July 17.—The London Standard's correspondent has cabled that a party of twenty Canadians has been plundered by rebels near Nanyan For, while seeking a place of safety.

The Rev. R. P. McKay, Secretary of the Canadian Presbyterian Foreign Missions, says that there is reason to fear that this is the party of Canadians who were making their way from Chungang, in Northern Honan to Hankow, a distance of 250 miles.

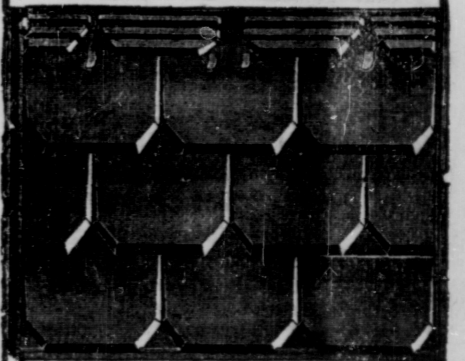
