

**The Charlottetown Hospital.**

At the invitation of His Lordship the Bishop of Charlottetown, Messrs. Hobkirk, Macleod, Canning and Conroy met, on Wednesday, 22nd inst., in the dispensary of the Hospital now opened under the auspices of His Lordship and under the management of the Sisters of Charity.

On motion, His Lordship was appointed to the Chair and the undersigned Secretary to the meeting.

It was moved by Dr. Macleod, seconded by Dr. Hobkirk and carried, that Dr. Conroy be the House Surgeon to the Hospital.

Dr. Taylor, by letter, expressed his regret at being unable to attend, and assured the meeting of his active co-operation.

The following medical rules and regulations were agreed upon:—

1. The medical department of the institution will be under the management of the following staff of physicians; viz:—Messrs. Hobkirk, Jenkins, Taylor, Macleod, Conroy, Canning and Beer.

2. A committee of three from the above-named staff will be chosen each year to manage the medical affairs of the institution—the said Committee to meet and report on the last day of each month.

3. All applicants for admission shall address themselves to Dr. Conroy, the House Surgeon, and with him all arrangements for such admissions will be made.

4. Free admission will be granted only to the helpless poor, and the number of such admissions shall be in accordance with the means of the institution.

5. No incurable or contagious disease will be admitted to the Hospital.

6. Private rooms will be reserved for special patients; these will have the privilege of choosing their own medical attendant from the Hospital staff in consideration of the payment of the Hospital fee.

7. No person shall be allowed to give any article whatsoever to any patient in the Hospital without permission from the Superiress of the institution.

8. Two physicians from the Hospital staff will attend monthly and in regular rotation.

The following being a summary of the rules and regulations for the internal management of the institution were also submitted and cordially adopted:—

1. The Charlottetown Hospital will be under the management of the Sisters of Charity and open to the sick of all denominations.

2. The religious convictions of patients will be respected and not interfered with in any way.

3. Any clergyman called for by a patient will be notified of the same.

4. The ordinary rules for the good order of the establishment shall be observed by all patients.

In accordance with the above regulations Messrs. Hobkirk, Jenkins and Canning were appointed the Medical Committee for the ensuing year; and Messrs. McLeod and Conroy were appointed visiting Physicians for the first month.

The Hospital is now open for the reception of patients, subject to the above regulations, and the aid and kindly sympathy of the public are respectfully solicited.

**News from Cape Breton**

Great Victory for the Liberal-Conservatives.

NATIONAL POLICY ENDORSED.  
McLeod Elected.

Special Dispatch to Examiner.

NORTH SYDNEY, C. B., Oct. 24.

The result of the election in Cape Breton County is as follows: McLeod 1097, Dodd 809, McKay, 868, the two former Conservatives, the latter a Unit. The issue was the National Policy. The result is regarded as a great Liberal-Conservative victory.

**CANADIAN.**

OTTAWA, Oct. 22.

A rumor comes from Cornwall that Clark Brown will confess to further atrocities before he is hanged, among others the poisoning of an uncle.

Frank Rimer was sentenced this morning on two charges of forgery, to four years in the penitentiary.

At the assizes, this morning, John Deal, was discharged in the kidnapping case, and Thomas R. Deal was sentenced to two years and one day in jail. The younger brother was immediately re-arrested for the larceny of a sail boat in which he crossed the lake from Oakville to Niagara, the day after Jaffray was kidnapped.

**IRELAND.**

LONDON, Oct. 22.

At a conference on the land question it was decided to form a land league for Ireland. Parnell was elected President. He will go to the United States to invoke the aid of Irishmen there.

**GERMANY.**

BERLIN, Oct. 22.

Russian journals regard the conquest of Merv as improbable before 1880, owing to the death of camels and scarcity of provisions.

[This is in contradiction of a report, cabled a few days ago, that the Russians had entered Merv, after a severe struggle.—Ed.]

**UNITED STATES.**

CHEYENNE, Wis., Oct. 22.

Lieut. William B. Wier, ordnance officer, while out hunting, was killed and mutilated by the Indians. All the available cavalry started on the trail this morning.

MEMPHIS, Oct. 22.

Three new cases in this city. Eight cases at Bailey Station.

CONCORDIA, MISS., Oct. 23.

Nine new cases of yellow fever here yesterday and three deaths.

HAVANA, Oct. 22.

The Spanish steamer "Parjaro de Oceans," lying between Porto Rico and St. Thomas, recently took fire and was destroyed off Caibarien. Ten of the crew and two passengers arrived at Caibarien. The fate of the other persons aboard is unknown, but it is supposed they were saved.

PARIS, Oct. 22.

The Government intend to present a report to the Chambers to show that most of the Communists remaining in New Caledonia are not deserving of mercy, and only a few of them should be pardoned.

**RUSSIA.**

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 22.

The Russian press expresses great indignation at Salisbury's allusion to Russia in his recent speech at Manchester. The "Official Messenger" says: "It is unusual for a Foreign Minister to speak thus of a friendly nation, and such language is not calculated to contribute to the maintenance of peace and good relations."

**SPAIN.**

MADRID, Oct. 22.

The Committee having in charge the subject of slavery, adopted the report proposing slavery be abolished in Cuba, but stipulating that negroes who are enfranchised shall, during the maximum period of five years, continue to work for their present masters, receiving not less than ten piastres per month.
