

Yanks And White Sox Win Dodgers Split With Cubs

NEW YORK (AP)—Yogi Berra drove in four runs with four hits and Whitey Ford pitched his first complete game since opening day Tuesday as New York Yankees celebrated Casey Stengel's 57th birthday with a 10-4 rout of Kansas City Athletics.

It was the American League leaders' 14th victory in 15 games with their Kansas City "cousins" this season and their seventh straight over the A's at Yankee Stadium.

Berra, wearing glasses in an attempt to get out of a season-long slump, smashed his 17th home run and added three singles. Ford, ace lefthander hampered by shoulder miseries much of the season, survived a shaky start to go the distance for the first time since he beat Washington 2-1 on April 18.

Ford allowed 13 hits, eight runs and three of Kansas City's runs in the first three innings, winning his sixth against two losses.

Although far from his best, Ford coasted after the early innings behind a 16-hit Yankee attack off A's starter and loser Rip Coleman, and successors Tom Morgan, Mickey McDermott and Jack Urban.

Rookie Tony Kubek and Elston Howard each drove in two runs and Mickey Mantle drove in another while enjoying a perfect day at the plate with two singles, sacrifice fly and two walks. Mantle boosted his season's stroll total to 112.

Berra's home run was the Yankees' 10th, giving them 34 seasons in which they've hit 100 or more.

CHICAGO (AP)—Chicago Cubs Tuesday needed two starting pitchers to snuff out a ninth-inning Dodger rally to save a 4-3 win after Brooklyn rode to a 1-0 victory in the opener of a double-header.

Dick Drott and Don Elston took turns retiring the Dodgers in the ninth of the nightcap after Sandy Amoros opened with his sixth homer, a drive into the left field seats, off winner Dave Hillman.

Drott gave up two walks, sandwiched Charley Neal's sacrifice before Elston came aboard to get a fly, and end the game on Junior Gilliam's grounder to Jack Littrell, the Chicago shortstop.

Don Newcombe was charged with the loss, his ninth, after giving up the Cubs' first three runs. The Dodgers threw out two Cubs at the plate in the thrill-packed opener to save Sal Maglie's 10th straight win over Chicago. Maglie has not lost to the Cubs since they beat him here, 5-3, Aug. 4, 1953.

Bonus boy Moe Drabowsky, who yielded only five hits in the eight innings he worked and fanned 11 Dodgers during this span drew the loss—his 10th against six victories.

BOSTON (AP)—Veteran Bob Porterfield allowed only four singles and didn't walk a batter Tuesday night in hurling Boston Red Sox to a 4-0 victory over the injury-riddled Detroit Tigers.

The 33-year-old right-hander, a big disappointment to the Red Sox since being obtained from Washington before the start of the 1956 campaign, struck out three in pitching his second straight complete game.

The triumph was the third of the season for Porterfield, who until five days ago had failed to go the distance since July, 1956.

Boston's Jackie Jensen provided the offensive power by driving in three runs with his 14th homer and a single. He upped his RBI total to 69.

BALTIMORE (AP)—John Gray, making his first start in the major leagues since 1954, throttled Baltimore Orioles on three hits while pitching Cleveland Indians to a 6-0 victory Tuesday night.

The 29-year-old right-hander, who had a 3-12 record with the old Philadelphia Athletics in 1954, was recalled from San Diego of the Pacific Coast League last Saturday after 2½ years in the minors.

Gray had been plagued by wildness in the past, but walked only two batters Tuesday night and had a one-hitter going into the ninth.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Minnie Minoso and Larry Doby each crashed two home runs Tuesday night in the presence of President Eisenhower as Chicago White Sox defeated Washington, 7-1, behind the three-hit pitching of Dick Donovan. Roy Sievers smashed his 26th homer for the Senators.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Joe Cunningham, who only hits 'em in the clutch, smashed a grand slam homer off the light tower Tuesday night, boosting St. Louis Cardinals past New York Giants, 7-3.

Cunningham's blast was the only Cardinal hit off Ruben Gomez of the Giants in the ninth, coming after three walks. The 25-year-old left-handed swinger from New Jersey beat Pittsburgh with an 11th inning homer Sunday and has specialized in clutch hits all season. It was his seventh homer.

It was the fourth straight victory for the Cards, and seventh in nine starts in the current home stand, and kept them a half-game behind front-running Milwaukee Braves beat Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-2.

Two errors and a passed ball gave the Braves three unearned runs off bonus baby Art Swanson. Gene Freese drove in both Pirate runs, one with a home run.

The victory preserved the Braves' half game lead over St. Louis Cardinals in the National League pennant race.

Clem Crowley, Hall's manager, feels the same way. Dick who fought some good men recalled Clem. He's beaten fighters like Eddy Armstrong, who had 10 ko's in 18 fights before Hall defeated him. Dick has also beaten young Joe Walcott of Boston who has a very impressive record and Sammy Walker, the former New England Middleweight Champion. Crowley said his boy started fighting at 15 when he weighed 140, he's always fought bigger men and capitalized on his speed and a good left to carry him through. Dick is a southpaw. He handles weight and has little trouble ranging between 150 and 160 pounds he will probably weigh in at 155 for Thursdays scrap.

McCLUSKEY FAVORITE

McCluskey will rule a slight favorite because he has been a round longer than the Boston Star, but hall is on the climb and has come along steady, if he connects there could be no predictions made on his future, a world title would not be too fetched for Hall, and his backers to see on the horizon. Hall must win this bout if he is to go through with a Boston Garden bout with New England Champion, Barry Allison, later on in the summer. Hall showed in his first fight with McCluskey that he has the necessary qualifications to rise to the top of the division.
