CIVIC ELECTION BY THE MAYOR

IN pursuance of an act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled: "An Act to amend the Act of the eighth year of Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intituled 'An Act to Incorporate the town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same'."

Election of a Mayor and one person to serve as a Common Councilman in the City Council for each Ward of said City.

Being in all six MAYOR and FIVE COMMON COUNCILMEN, will be held on

Wednesday, the 28th day of January, A. D. 1885,

At the several places, that is to say:

In Ward No. 1, at or near the store of Messrs J. & T. Morris, corner of Queen and Water Streets.

In Ward No. 2, at or near the house of Thomas Connolly, opposite Mr. R. Hearty's Warehouse, Sydney Street, between Great George and Prince Streets.

In Ward No. 3, at or near the Market House.

In Ward No. 4, at or near the Fire Engine House, fronting on Kent Street, east, between Weymouth and Cumberland Streets.

In Ward No. 5, at or near the house of Widow Tierney, corners of Euston and Great George Streets.

And at the said Election the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

DESCRIPTION OF WARDS.

Number One shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Dorchester Street, and the parcel of land formerly known as the Military Barrack Ground.

Number Two shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Richmond Street and north of Dorchester Street.

Number Three shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Grafton Street and north of Richmond Street.

Number Four shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Fitzroy Street and north of Grafton Street.

Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies north of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said Town.

NOMINATION DAY.

Act 43, Victoria, Cap. 15.—"Seven Days before the time of any and every election for Mayor or Councillors, the Person or Candidates for the office of Mayor or Councillor shall give their names in as such Candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences and additions of such persons, together with the office and wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination for such candidates."

There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor, at the same time, a fee of ten dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councillor, a fee of five dollars, which sums shall go toward paying the cost of the election.

No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councillor unless such nomination be made in manner and the time aforesaid.

The time appointed for the nomination of candidates, shall be from the time of twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose.

SOME two hundred old students of Montreal College attended the meeting held in Montreal on the 20th inst., to inaugurate the arrangements for the proposed convention.

THE receipt of a mysterious tin box in the Public Works Department at Ottawa, on the 21st inst., caused a scare among the employees, visions of dynamite rising before their eyes.

WILL LIQUIDATE.—The Moncton "Universal Knitting Machine Company" has gone into liquidation. The liabilities amount to \$17,000, and the assets are put down at \$15,000.

THE temperance people of Halifax City and county have decided to submit the Scott Act to the electors as soon as preliminaries can be arranged. Strong opposition may be expected in Halifax City.

SCOTT ACT.—At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, P. Connolly and Fred K. Bevan were each fined \$50 and costs for breaches of the Scott Act. The case of Edward Simpson was adjourned.

A KANSAS cowboy stopped a stage full of passengers and made them wait until he read a poem of thirty-two verses dedicated to his Mary Jane. Referring to this the Detroit Free Press says there are some things as bad as shooting.

EARL CAIENS wishes it to be distinctly understood that his going on the stage has no connection whatever with the recent Fortescue-Garnomey case, but is solely due to his having joined St. Peter's Band of Hope Theatrical Company.

GOOD.—We learn with pleasure that Mr. Vinicombe has at length consented to give the long wished for instruction on the violin to some of our young ladies. This is a move in the right direction and we hope many will avail themselves of so rare an opportunity.

HEAVY JUDGMENT.—In the suit of George Stephen of the C. P. R., against Barlow, representing the South Eastern Ry., the defendant has been adjudged to pay one and a half million dollars due on sixteen promissory notes.

PRESIDENT INCH, of the Mount Allison College, Sackville, has published a letter in the Halifax Mail, stating that college federation on the basis of the Ontario scheme would be satisfactory to him. He proposes that the scheme should include the whole Maritime Provinces.

COLONEL SNOW, of the Short Line Railway, who is in Ottawa now, stated to a reporter, on the 22nd inst., that the American capitalists had handed over the control of matters to the Canadian members of the company, with the hope that they would be able to do better with the Government.

H. H. WARNER, of Rochester, N. Y. observatory, offers two hundred dollars gold for any new comet or the comet of 1815, found this year, and two hundred dollars for the best 3,000 word essay on the cause of the recent red light appearances at sunset. The competition is open to North and South America, the West Indies, Great Britain and Australia.

HIBBERT THOMPSON has been committed for trial for shooting Samuel Robar, with intent to kill, at New Germany, Lunenburg, N. S., on the night of the 10th inst. Robar was going home on Saturday night, and when about a quarter of a mile from his house a shot was fired from the side of the road, striking him in the arm and passing across his side, tearing his two coats and shirt. The charge was either heavy shot or slugs.

SCOTT ACT.—At a meeting of the Ontario Branch of the Dominion Alliance at Ottawa, on the 22nd. J. McLaren and S. H. Blake, Q. C., addressed the meeting, contending that the Scott Act was constitutional. A lively discussion arose with regard to the submission of a plebiscite on the question of prohibition at the next general election. It was voted down. The majority of the delegates holding it would injuriously affect the Scott Act contents in progress.

THE preliminary examination into a scandalous case was begun in the Halifax police court on the 21st. Rev. Wm. Lough, junior garrison chaplain, is charged by the wife of Sergeant Talbot, of the military hospital corps, with making indecent proposals to her. Portions of the evidence are of a disgusting character. The clergyman during his residence in Halifax has borne an excellent character, and declares the case to be an attempt at blackmail. The court room was thronged with listeners all day eager to hear the testimony.

THE investigation into the frauds practised upon the Dominion Government and their clients, by the absconding Montreal Customs brokers, by means of counterfeit invoices, has revealed deficiencies so far amounting to between forty and fifty thousand dollars, which will have to be made good by the importers under pain of confiscation of the goods.

THE ROLLER SKATING RINK at Summerside opens to-day. The proprietor, Mr. Muttart, has issued cards of invitation to a great many ladies and gentlemen in Summerside. He gives them the use of skates and the rink free for three days. No doubt a great many will take advantage of this generous offer, to learn the art of gliding quietly on rollers. The rink is on the upper flat of the building known as Montgomery's Hall. It is oval in shape, and laid with narrow hard pine flooring. It is a little over ninety feet long, and thirty feet wide. It has a very neat appearance. The walls and ceiling being plastered and whitewashed, and gaily decorated with Chinese lanterns, oil paintings, chromos, and hunting. Every afternoon is set apart for ladies only, and the evenings for ladies and gentlemen. It was not the bard of Summerside who said:—

Hear them prate, prate, prate, The skater with his mate, Oh, the skates, the merry, merry skate! There's many a love—ly story they relate, As they speed at fearful pace— 'Tis of an Cupid seals the fate, Be sure and save your prate, Ere it shall be too late; For 'tis so very very great To ride upon the merry, merry skate— 'Tis better far than swinging on the gate.
